On Sunday January 15, Hyacinth Taylor and Olga Baird-Joefield, were installed as Missionaries to the Moravian Mission in Grenada. It was a very moving experience as we gathered in the recently constructed building for worship at Mount Tranquil, Vincennes, St. David's Gre-



nada. The service was planned for 3 pm and it was indeed an inspired decision by God, for it rained all morning. The afternoon weather was great. Approximately 80 persons gathered for the event. The Sanctuary was filled to overflowing and at least 20 persons overflowed into the road. The people were excited and ready to claim this movement as theirs.

We were blessed to have had sharing in the worship, the Rev. Hilton Joseph, Rev. Nasel Ephraim and Brother M J Byron from the St. Kitts Conference. In addition, Sisters Betty sus Christ; without distinc-Duncan and Raynelle Rollocks from the Tobago Conference were there in support. At the

end of the installation Litany, Rev. Joseph, Rev. Ephraim and Rev. Dr. Jarvis surrounded the missionaries and laid hands upon them. I share with you the message that was preached on the occasion.

As we meet for this special occasion, I want to share the following verses from Psalm 25: Show me your ways O Lord, teach me your paths; guide me in your truth and teach me, for you are God my Saviour, and my hope is in you all day long. (Psalm 25: 4-5).

Different people struggle with different things in life. Different people struggle with things like: Anger, bitterness, unforgiveness, unconfessed sin, lusts, greed, adultery, uncontrolled sexual appetite, lack of faith, disobedience, idols in their lives, wrong motives, disregard for others, disregard for God, lack of transparency with God and others.

Notice what our text says, Show me your ways O Lord, teach me your paths; guide me in your truth and teach me, for you are God my Saviour, and my hope is in you all day long.

The Psalmists is in trouble. He is crowded in by his enemies who are seeking to trample and destroy him. He is scared of the impending danger on the one hand, and on the other hand, he expresses hope and confidence in God. He literally testifies about God's faithfulness. Even when the fires of death surrounds us, we need to be able to testify of God's faithfulness. We need to be able to acclaim like the song writer, Frances R. Havergal:

> He will never fail us, He will not forsake, His eternal Covenant, He will never break Resting on His promise, What have we to fear? God is all sufficient, For the coming year.

Onward then and fear not, Children of the day For His words shall never, Never pass away.

There are three (3) fundamental requests in the text:

Show me your ways, means to display, exhibit, put on view, parade, reveal, bare, let somebody see, to demonstrate, illustrate, explain, prove, confirm.

Teach me your paths, means to educate, tutor, school, lecture, instruct, edify, coach, train, clarify.

Guide me in your truth and teach me. Guide me, means to direct, show, steer, lead, conduct, channel, funnel, point, pilot, escort. In other words, God you are my manual.

...For you are God my Saviour and my hope is in you all day long.

You are Jehovah Shalom...my peace. You are Jehovah Rophe...my healer. You are Jehovah m'kadesh...my sanctifier You are Jehovah Jireh...my provider. You are Jehovah TSidkenu...my righteousness You are Jehovah Nissi...my banner You are Jehovah Shammah...The Lord is present You are Jehovah Rohi...my Shepherd The story is told of a Scottish woman who earned a modest living by peddling her wares along the roads of her country. Each day she would travel about, and when she came to an intersection, she would toss a stick into the air. Whichever way the stick pointed was the way she went. On one occasion an old man stood across the road from her as she tossed the stick into the air once, twice, three times. Finally the old man asked, "Why are you throwing the stick like that? I'm letting God show me the way to go by using this stick, she said."Then why did you throw it three times?" the old man asked."Because the first two times. He was pointing me in the wrong direction," was her reply. The ultimate purpose of prayer is not to get what we want, but to learn to want what God gives. But that will never happen if we don't surrender our will and put ourselves on God's agenda instead of our own. First Peter 5:7 declares, "Cast all your anxiety on Him because He cares for you."

A person whose will is surrendered to God has a relationship with Him similar to the one described in the parable of the vine and branches. It says, "If you remain in me and my words remain in you, ask whatever you wish, and it will be given you" (John 15:7). You see, the branch depends on the vine and lives in one accord with it. In return, the vine provides it with everything it needs, and the result is great fruitfulness. There are great benefits to surrendering your Will to God. One is that God promises to answer your prayers and grant your requests. Jeremiah 33:3, 'Call to Me, and



I will answer you, and show you great and mighty things, which you do not know.' Another is that we get to receive the power of Christ through the Holy Spirit. Just as the vine and the branches, He flows through us, gives us power and produces fruit.

Developing an effective prayer life depends on keeping your relationship with God strong and uncluttered by sin and disobedience. First Peter 3: 12, declares, "The eyes of the Lord are on the righteous and his ears are atten tive to their prayer, but the face of the Lord is against those who do evil." If we strive for righteousness and confess our sins, we can remain close to God, but, maintaining our relationship with Him is an ongoing process. Every day we need to go to God and ask Him to reveal anything that may be hindering our progress.

Sister hyacinth and Sister Olga, as you embark on this Ministry, there are going to be challenges, for the enemy is not satisfied that you have come as heralds of the good



news of Jesus Christ in this community. You have to be steadfast. You have to be strong. You have to surrender yourselves everyday to God and depend upon Him completely. The Psalmists gives us all reason for hope, when he testifies, "Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil: for thou art with me; thy rod and thy staff they comfort me. Thou preparest a table before me in the presence of mine enemies: thou anointest my head with oil; my cup runneth over." (Psalm 23:4-5).

Notice the assurance that the Psalmists gives you. When you are surrounded by your enemies, who are ready to devour and destroy you, what more do you want to hear than, "You prepare a Table before me in the presence of mine enemies: you anointest my head with oil; my cup runneth over".

God is sitting you down to eat and refresh yourselves, even with your enemies coming after you. You see, when you are Covered by God, you are well covered. Isaiah declares, "No weapon that is formed against thee shall prosper; and every tongue that shall rise against thee in judgment thou shalt condemn. This is the heritage of the servants of the LORD, and their righteousness is of me, saith the LORD". (Isaiah 54:17). I challenge you therefore as you live and Minister amongst the people here in Grenada, to leave everything into the hands of Almighty God. As you do so, be wise as serpents and harmless as doves. Point the people to Jesus. Psalm 139: 23-24, contains the Words of David, a man after God's own heart, who had one of the best relationships with God in the Bible:

Search me, O God, and know my heart; Try me, and know my anxieties; and see if *there is any* wicked way in me, and lead me in the way everlasting **David overcame some horrible sins in his life to be close to God. He was an Adulterer and a murderer, yet he humbled himself before God and confessed his sins. As a result, that allowed him to come closer to God and it kept growing and building in his relationship with Him.** David is a great model for us to follow. If God was able to forgive him and build a special relationship with him, then He can do the same with us. If we are faithful, God will draw us close to Him. He will answer our prayers.

Are you willing for God to Show you His ways, Teach you His paths and Guide you? Are you willing to say, Lord, I will walk with you wherever you lead me?



Jesus says: Come to Me, all *you* who labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. Take My yoke upon you and learn from Me, for I am gentle and lowly in heart, and you will find rest for Your souls. For My yoke *is* easy and My burden is light." (Matt. 11: 28-30). Amen.

He was ordained a Deacon on April 11, 1951 at the Spring

Gardens Moravian Church in Antigua. (60 years)

He was consecrated a Presbyter on May 19, 1959 at the Estridge Moravian Church in St. Kitts. (52 years)

He was consecrated Bishop on November 11, 1993 at the Spring Gardens Moravian Church in Antigua by Bishop(s) Neville Neil, John Wilson and Stanley Thomas. (18 years)

He served in the following places:

Antigua:-1950-1952;	Tobago:-1952-1954;
Antigua:-1954-1956;	St. Kitts:-1956-1961;
Antigua:-1961-1970;	Trinidad:-1970-1980;

He was the Chairman of the Provincial Elders Conference (PEC) from 1978-1984.

He was Superintendent in the Antigua Conference in 1984 and Pastor of the Greenbay/Five Islands Pastorate from 1984-1993.

In July of 1993 He Retired, He was elected Bishop and Consecrated Bishop on November 11, 1993 in Antigua and Pastor of the Cana Moravian Church from 1993—1999..

Bishop Brown served God and the Church with distinction. We have lost a Soldier in the Army of the Lord.

A Thanksgiving Service or the Late Bishop Neville Brown will be held on Friday February 03, 2012, at the Spring Gardens Moravian Church in Antigua at 11:00 a.m. Burial will take place at the Newfield (Enon) Moravian Church Cemetery in Newfield. The International Ecumenical Peace Convocation met in Kingston Jamaica in 2011. At the end of the Convocation, this message was sent out.

"Glory to God and Peace on Earth"

We understand peace and peacemaking as an indispensable part of our common faith. Peace is inextricably related to the love, justice and freedom that God has granted to all human beings through Christ and the work of the Holy Spirit as a gift and vocation. It constitutes a pattern of life that reflects human participation in God's love for the world. The dynamic nature of peace as gift and vocation does not deny the existence of tensions, which form an intrinsic element of human relationships, but can alleviate their destructive force by bringing justice and reconciliation.

We, nearly 1,000 participants from more than 100 nations, called together by the WCC, have shared the experience of the International Ecumenical Peace Convocation (IEPC), a gathering of Christian churches and their inter-religious partners dedicated to the pursuit of Peace in the community, Peace with the Earth, Peace in the market place and Peace among the peoples. We met on the campus of the University of the West Indies (Mona) near Kingston, Jamaica from 17 through 25 May, 2011.

As we gathered in Jamaica, we were keenly aware of events in the world around us. Stories from our churches remind us of local, pastoral and social responsibilities for people who must deal daily with each of the issues we discussed. The aftermath of earthquake and tsunami, in Japan raises urgent questions concerning nuclear energy and threats to nature and humanity. Governmental and financial institutions face the necessity of taking responsibility for their failed polices and the devastating impact on vulnerable people. We witness with concern and compassion the struggle for freedom, justice and human rights of the people in may Arab countries and other contexts where brave people struggle with global attention. Our love for the peoples of Israel and Palestine convinces us that the continued occupation damages both peoples. We renew our solidarity with the people of divided countries such as the Korean peninsula and Cyprus, and people yearning for peace and an end to suffering in nations like Colombia, Iraq, Afghanistan and the Great Lakes region of Africa.

We realize that Christians have often been complicit in systems of violence, injustice, militarism, racism, casteism, intolerance and discrimination.

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We ask God to forgive us our sins, and to transform us as agents of righteousness and advocates of Just Peace. We appeal to governments and other groups to stop using religion as a pretext for the justification of violence.

Peace in the community

Churches learn the complexities of Just Peace as we hear of the Intersection of multiple injustices and oppressions that are simultaneously at work in the lives of many. Members of one family or community may be oppressed and also the oppressors of others. Churches must help in identifying the everyday choices that can end abuse and promote human rights, gender justice, climate justice, economic justice, unity and peace. The churches need to continue to confront racism and casteism as dehumanizing realities in today's world. Likewise, violence against women and children must be named as sin. Conscious efforts are required for the full integration of differently abled people. Issues of sexuality divide the churches, and therefore we ask the WCC to create safe spaces to address dividing issues of human sexuality.

Peace with the Earth

The environmental crisis is profoundly an ethical and spiritual crisis of humanity. Recognizing the damage human activity has done to the Earth, we affirm our commitment to the integrity of creation and the daily lifestyle it demands. Our concern for the earth and our concern for humanity go hand in hand. Natural resources and common goods such as water must be shared in a just and sustainable manner. We join global civil society in urging governments to reconstruct radically all our economic activities towards the goal of an ecologically sustainable economy. The extensive use of fossil fuels and CO₂ emissions must be reduced urgently to a level that keeps climate change limited.

Peace in the marketplace

The global economy often provides many examples of structural violence that victimizes not through the direct use of weapons or physical force but by passive acceptance of widespread poverty, trade disparities and inequality among classes and nations. In contrast to unfettered economic growth as envisioned by the neoliberal system, the Bible signals a vision of life in abundance for all. The churches must learn to advocate more effectively for full implementation of economic, social and cultural rights as the foundation for "economies of life."

It is a scandal that enormous amounts of money are spent on military budgets and toward providing weapons for allies and the arms trade while this money is urgently needed to eradicate poverty around the globe, and to fund an ecologically and socially responsible reorientation of the world economy.

Peace among the peoples

History, especially in the witness of the historic peace churches, reminds us of the fact that violence is contrary to the will of God and can never resolve conflicts. It is for this reason that we are moving beyond the doctrine of just war towards a commitment to Just Peace. It requires moving from exclusive concepts of national security to safety for all. This includes a day-to-day responsibility to prevent, that is, to avoid violence at its root. Many practical aspects of the concept of Just Peace require discussion, discernment and elaboration. We continue to struggle with how innocent people can be protected from injustice, war and violence. In this light, we struggle with the concept of the "responsibility to protect" and its possible misuse.

In our journey towards Just Peace, a new international agenda is of the utmost urgency because of the scope of dangers surrounding us. We call on the ecumenical movement as a whole, and particularly those planning the WCC Assembly of 1023 in Busan, Korea, with the theme "God of life, lead us to justice and peace", to make Just Peace, in all its dimensions, a key priority.

All thanks and praise to you, O Triune God: Glory to you, and peace to your people on earth. God of life, lead us to justice and peace. Amen.

All are reminded that for the Hymn of the Month for February 2012 is #79 Jesus, good above all other found in the section *The Son of God: His Life On Earth*. The recommended tune is the set tune HQUEM **PASTORES LAUDAVERE**. The text of this hymn draws attention to the person of Jesus and reminds us not only of his birth but also the purpose of his coming. It is hoped that in the singing of this hymn we will



begin to prepare ourselves for the observance of Lenten season.

As we move ahead and look towards the compilation of the final hymnal, an appeal is being made to all congregations to submit their top 10 - 15 worship songs/ praise choruses. The Committee intends to give consideration for the inclusion of the same in the hymnal. However, so as to ensure that we secure the necessary copyright permission, these submissions must include the following:

The title of the song and the complete text. The name of the author and/or arranger. The name and address of the copyright holder.

We have not yet decided how many of these will eventually be included in the hymnal. However, the Committee is making this appeal at this time as we attempt to ensure that the content of the hymnal reflects traditional and Caribbean hymns as well as contemporary worship songs and praise choruses. It must be emphasized that because the latter is most likely still under copyright ownership and not in the public domain that we need to have the copyright information as part of whatever submissions are made. In the process of compiling the hymn, we are deliberately seeking to avoid

any copyright infringement since this will have some legal ramifications.
