

#### **Helping outsiders become insiders**

The Church exists, not to glorify itself, but to point sinners to Jesus. The Church does not exists to Judge people and to determine who will go to Heaven and who won't. Judgement belongs to God and God alone. The strange thing is, some Persons have



set up themselves as Judges in the Kingdom. The bible declares that the time will come when judgement will begin at the house of God. 1 Peter 4:17, "For the time is come that judgment must begin at the house of God: and if it first begin By the grace of God, we seek at us, what shall the end be of them that obey not the gospel of God?"

churches are not growing, yet Jesus' command to the Church was to "go and make disciples." There are three reasons why every church needs to be concerned with growth and assimilation.

- 1. There are many who have never heard the good news that Jesus loves them and that His church is for them. In Luke 14:23 the Master said, "Go out into the country lanes and out behind the hedges and urge anyone you find to come, so that the house will be full" (TLB). Jesus revealed His mission in Luke 19:10: "For the Son of Man came to seek and to save what was lost" (NIV). Jesus is concerned with our making outsiders into insiders. We must target lost people with bridge events that will connect and encourage them to visit our churches. Then we must have an assimilation strategy to retain those who visit. Studies indicate that when a church does not have an intentional strategy for assimilation, 91 percent of visitors will not return and become part of the church. Many of these will also be lost to Christ's kingdom.
- 2. There are many who, after hearing and accepting the good news of Christ, are leaving the church through the back doors.

A study by *Servant Magazine* indicated that every week over 53,000 people leave the church and never return. These people are not only lost to the church, but possibly for eternity.

Proverbs 27:23 says, "Be sure you know the condition of your flocks, give careful attention to your herds" (NIV). The diligent shepherd in Luke 15 illustrates how concerned we need to be for those who are lost to the kingdom of God.

3. There are many former church attendees and Christians in our communities.

When people move, they often do not join a church in their new community. How can we help visitors who attend our church move from being outsiders to insiders?


John Maxwell says, "A visitor is the most important person that attends church on Sunday. His attendance has been motivated by a friend or a deep need. He brings his hurts, questions, and apprehensions. He looks for warmth, acceptance, and smiles."

What causes people to assimilate into a church? It is relationships. Our assimilation ministry must help guests establish relationships with people in the church, to move from being outsiders to being insiders. Robert W. Jeambey reports that 43 percent of all people who leave congregations do so because of "nonacceptance and unrelatedness."

When visitors walk through the door, they will decide in a short space of time whether they will take you seriously and whether they will return. It is vital for Leaders and Pastors in the church to be prepared to receive visitors. The entire membership needs to meet visitors and help them get acquainted and involved in relationship building in the church. This is not the ministry of a few select people. This philosophy needs to be reinforced often and so our Pastors are challenged to make sure that this happens.

People must feel loved and wanted when they enter our doors. The entire membership needs to be galvanized to accept and embrace visitors when they make an effort to visit our Church. No one should tell a visitor or another member that you are sitting in my seat. All the seats belongs to God. If however, a member wants a specific seat, that member should try to arrive early to Church.

Some people do not return to your Church, because they were driven out, while others do not return because there was no love and warmth. The worship might have been good, but they saw that it was only a show. It was not meaningful. They did not see walk and talk lining up. If these things are not seen, we will have a difficult time, helping outsiders become insiders and our Church will continue to lose members.

#### 30<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Service for Rev. Dr. Cicely Athill-Horsford by Bro. Glynne St. Hill

A special church service to mark the thirtieth anniversary of the ordination of the Rev. Dr. Cicely Athill –

Horsford was held on Sunday September 23<sup>rd</sup> 2012 at the historic Mount Tabor Moravian Church, St John, Barbados at 5.00 p.m.



The service was attended by a congregation of over

two hundred and seventy five persons who included the parliamentary representative for the parish of St John, Mrs. Mara Thompson; Senator Andre Worrell from the nearby village of Sherbourne; the Opposition's candidate for the parish, Mr. Hudson Griffith; the Chairman of the P.E.C, Rev. Dr. Cortroy Jarvis; representatives of the Barbados Christian Council; clergy from the areas around Mount Tabor; members of the "Talk your Talk" Priest, a radio programme on national radio (CBC); fellow Moravian clergy and representatives of their congregations; the Principal of the Mt Tabor Primary School, as well as members of the Mount Tabor and Penuel congregations.

The service began with an introit – "Lead me Lord, lead me in my righteousness" from the Moramus Singers of



Barbados with the Sisters bedecked in their bright red bodices and black skirts supported by the Brothers in their white shirts, black pants and coloured ties, during which the Rev. Dr. Cicely and family had

entered the church and were seated.

The Chairman for the evening's proceedings was Rev. Ezra Parris, Secretary of the PEC and the Pastor of the Sharon/Dunscombe congregations.

The first Hymn – "Praise to the Lord Almighty" was lustily sung by the congregation and this was followed by a special liturgy led by liturgist Rev Movelle Kellman.

A welcome was then extended to all present after which a long standing member of Penuel congregation,

Bro. Elliott Brewster paid tribute in song followed by Mr. Kenneth Armstrong a friend of the organizers of the service.

A specially formed combined choir consisting of all the

fellowship groups of the Mount Tabor then gave two musical renditions one of which was "My Jesus I love thee." During the singing of the second rendition "Can't give up

The Church Choir then made their contribution in song, which preceded a powerful sermon from the Chairman of the P.E.C. in which he encouraged Rev. Cicely to look back but ignore any comments on where you came from; examine the present and prepare for the future. He also admonished her to keep her ears close to the ground, show love to everyone and maintain her honesty and integrity. The sermon was punctuated with many anecdotes which kept the congregation very much awake and yearning for more.

At the conclusion of the sermon, the Moramus Singers responded by performing the anthem, "My Shepherd would supply my needs."

We give God thanks for the support from all Conferences to see the building reach to where it is today. The Virgin Islands Conference must be commended for providing the financial support to assist with the Restroom and electrical wiring.

It is with a sense of Joy to report that the Fellowship has received its Drum Set, Guitar and Key Board. A word of thanks must go out to all Synodals for the wonderful contribution made during the 30<sup>th</sup> Provincial Synod and the Cedar Hall congregation in Antigua. What is even more exciting is that God has positioned three (3) musicians, who were not members of the Fellowship, to offer themselves to play and to teach others to play. We give glory to God.

#### St. Maarten Moravian Church

The St. Maarten Moravian Church continues to be a collaborative effort between the EWIP and the Suriname Province; however, it is being administered by the Suriname Province. The EWIP is responsible for the English language service on the third Sunday of each month. The Church has grown since it got its own building. It has an average attendance at worship of sixty (60) persons. There is a membership of approximately eighty (80) persons. At present, the Chairman of PEC is the lead person from the EWIP, assisted by Bro. Errol Connor and Bro. Elroy Christopher.

Classes are being held every month to help to develop the Lay Leadership and eventually some Assistant Ministers for the Church. Classes are conducted in Mission, Evangelism, Leadership, Worship, Community Building, Bible and Counselling. The members are very enthusiastic and eager to be involved in the life of the Church.

#### **Tortola Fellowship**

The mission on Tortola had its high and lows throughout the period. The congregants must be commended for their steadfastness in the midst of change and unsettling times. In 2009-2010, Rev. Vankys Isaac as resident pastor worked hard to ensure that the some critical administrative plans were done in preparation for the construction of the sanctuary. Under the assiduous leadership of Rev George Bedford as interim Pastor, the construction of the first phase of the sanctuary was completed. This was done without acquiring a loan due to the prudent stewardship of the fellowship over the years, the support of the Conference and the congregations. The congregation is now ready for a resident Pastor to continue to strengthen the

pastoral care of members and to reach out to the unchurched in the community so that it can achieve congregation status in the new period.

The Tortola Fellowship will dedicate the first phase of its Sanctuary for worship on November 11, 2012. We rejoice with this Fellowship and look forward to great things happening there.

The Moravian Church is growing fastest in Tanzania and so there is always the need to support the work there. #### **Mission in our own Communities**

Some congregations have adopted needy families; give scholarships to successful children. Others have decided to feed the homeless and shut-ins. Some congregations have opened Mission centres for the distribution of food-stuff and clothing.

Most Conferences have begun to use the mass media for the proclamation of the Word of God, however, there are too many cases where both Radio and Television is available to us and we refuse to take up the offer for lack of adequate preparation. This is a tragedy. No Pastor should ever stand before the people of God unless he/she is prepared by God. Whether there is Television or Radio present at Worship, we should always be prepared to feed our people with FRESH BREAD. Let us seize every opportunity to touch our communities for God.

Academic Education has also been one of the goals of our church and the Early Childhood Care plays a significant part. We commend all of our congregations that continue to Minister through Pre Schools. High Commendation must also be given to the Trinidad and Virgin Islands Conferences for the continued Ministry through Day Schools.
