"Even if I knew that tomorrow the world would go to pieces, I would still plant my apple tree." Martin Luther had his own struggle to find peace with God. He fully dedicated himself to monastic life, the effort to do good works to please God and to serve others through prayer for their souls. Yet peace with God escaped him. He devoted himself to fasts, flagellations, long hours in prayer and pilgrimages, and constant confession. The more he tried to do for God, it seemed, the more aware he became of his sinfulness.

The controversy that broke loose with the publication of his 95 Theses on the door of the Wittingburg Chapel, placed even more pressure on the reformer to study

the Bible. This study convinced him that the Church had lost sight of several central truths. To Luther, the most important of these was the doctrine that brought him peace

With joy, Luther now believed and taught that salvation is a gift of God's grace, received by faith and trust in God's promise to forgive sins for the sake of Christ's death on the cross. This, he believed was God's work from beginning to end.

He said, "We are saved by faith alone, but the faith that saves is never alone."

Stepping out in faith really means to do what God said to do without knowing the outcome of it. It is simply obeying the voice of God without a clue as to what will happen.

Abraham stepped out in faith when God told him to leave his relatives and go into a land that God told him to go. Abraham went out not knowing where he was going. He did not leave before he heard from the Lord. This is stepping out on faith.

When we say that we are stepping out in faith without first hearing from God, that is, we are doing what we want to do and it is called being proud. God will resist it.

***We are supposed to follow the Lord, which means He is ahead of us and not us being in front of Him. When we put our will above Him, we will never achieve an expected result.

Stepping out in faith sounds good and make us think that we are righteous but we need to ask ourselves if this is what God desire for us to do. Stepping out in faith calls for us to wait upon God, for stepping out in faith without first hearing from God is actually stepping out of faith, because we are doing what we want to do. Hymn of the Month for February 2014 Mikie Roberts (Rev.) Chair, Provincial Hymnal Committee.



As was stated last month, for the next three months the hymns will be taken from the portion of the hymnal that contains hymn that are primarily geared towards the celebration of the Lord's Supper. Though we usually observe this sacrament only once monthly, the theology of these hymns merits them being sung other than at a Communion service. It is with that thought that we entrust the hymns for January, February and March to you with the hope that they will

also be sung at times other than during Holy Communion.

The hymn of the month for February is entitled simply Communion Hymn. This hymn was the result of the collaboration of attendees who participated at one of the many regional Caribbean music workshops that were hosted by the Caribbean Conference of Churches during the early 1980's. This particular hymn emerged from a workshop that was held in Jamaica. The tune is an adaptation of a Vincentian folk song. The melody is very simple and repetitive making it easy to learn. The rhythmic tempo which reflects our Caribbean culture should also lend itself to the hymn being easily taught to our congregations.

The simplicity of the music matches quite well with the text which is also simple and direct in its approach. The first verse focuses on the singing congregation as it comes to the Lord's Table. The second verse draws attention away from us to the Lord as our sharing in Communion is a reminder of the price paid for our sins. The third verse points to present and future realities in that as we share in Communion, we are transformed, a process that even though it has begun is not yet ended. In theological terms, this last verse proclaims the eschatological element of Holy Communion for the faith community.

This hymn was drawn from the Caribbean Hymnal – **Sing A New Song No. 3** which was published by the Caribbean Conference of Church. It will be a new addition to our Caribbean Moravian hymnal.

Do not be deceived; remember Saul lost his Kingdom because he did not wait on Samuel, the man of God who was to do the sacrifice. Samuel was delayed in coming to King Saul, he had a crisis on hand, and because Samuel was delayed, Saul offered up the sacrifice, which cost him the Kingdom.

The lesson we should learn from the incident with Saul is, not because it seems like the right thing to do; if it is not sanctioned by God, it is destined to fail. We could suffer dire consequences for stepping out in faith when God has not told us or instructed us so to do.

Let us walk boldly into the future, knowing that with faith in God we can accomplish anything.

Address By President Nelson Mandela To The Provincial Synod of the Moravian Church in South Africa, 10 July 1998

(Excerpts from the Moravian Messenger of January 2014)

Allow me to thank you most sincerely for inviting me to be with you on this occasion. It has a special meaning for me, because, as you will know, I decided in 1995 to rename my official residence in Cape Town after Genadendal, where the first Moravian mission in south Africa, was established.

You have just marked the 261st Anniversary of the Moravian Church in South Africa. You can look back with pride on over two and half centuries of contributing to the development of our people, both spiritual and social. In more recent times, too, the Moravian Church played an important role in the struggle against apartheid.

As a product of a mission education myself, I know personally how important the churches have been in a country where the government took no responsibility for the education of the majority of the population.

All of us know, too that the noble values which are strengthened by such an education, the principles of justice, mutual respect and tolerance, do not become a part of our social reality without struggle.

It was perhaps inevitable that even a church such as yours would experience the separation amongst its members that our country's history brought everywhere and in every sphere of life.

It was also natural that when the Moravian church decided a few years ago to become one church again it would also have to overcome the effects of many years of introduction and enforced separation.

It requires much hard work and respect for each other to turn the variety of language and culture in our country into the source of strength that it really is, rather than an instrument for creating division and mistrust that apartheid made it.

It is therefore a particular joy to learn that you have just accepted and adopted a new constitution, entrenching and protecting the unity of the church.

South Africa has seized the chance that freedom brings to begin building a better life for all its people. Such a process brings a fundamental social and political transformation that is bound to awaken anxieties and concerns in all communities, whether it be African, coloured, Indian or White.

We appreciate the concerned efforts of your church to overcome within your own body the divides that our social and political past created. It is a practical and valued contribution to nation-building, and strengthens us for the even greater tasks of today and tomorrow.

As I said: religion helped us as a people to keep alive the vision of a better society. Today it is called upon to help realize that vision in practice. It has a particular role to play as a partner in rebuilding the morality of our society.

The Moravian passion for welfare work, the profound understanding of the importance of education and training, and the dedication to spiritual and social development are invaluable assets as we face these challenges.

We take inspiration from the face that the Synod's theme is "A New Beginning". It tells us that our nation does have a tried and trusted partner in our efforts to turn South Africa into the country of our dream.

Jane Hutchings writes: Genadendal, six kilometers outside Greyton is the first and oldest mission station in South Africa. Genadendal ('Valley of Grace') was founded by Georg Schmidt, an early worker of the Moravian Missionary Society in 1738. On 1st February 1995 President Nelson Mandela announced that his official residence in Cape Town had been renamed Genadendal. On 10th October 1995 he paid the mission station an official visit.
