To speak of George Ramsay is to echo the words of the Hymn Writer M. Homer Cummings when he penned the words in one of our Hymns:

> I was lost and Jesus found me, found a sheep that went astray. Raised me up and gently led me, back into the narrow way.

> Yes, I'll sing the wondrous story of the Christ who died for me, sing it with the saints in glory, gathered by the crystal sea.

George often gave voice to his testimony of who he was before Jesus captured him. Since he was captured by the King of Kings and Lord of Lords, he endured many battles but his Faith in God never wavered.

He has served this Congregation Sharon Moravian Church where he was nurtured in the faith well. He has served the Moravian Church in Barbados well. He has served the Moravian Church, Eastern West Indies Province with distinction. In 1996 at the Provincial Synod in St. Croix, he was elected to the Provincial Elders Conference (PEC) and served for 10 unbroken years until 2006. He was re-elected in 2012 and 2015 in St. Thomas and Antigua respectively and served until his death on August 25, 2016. The PEC could have always depended on him for guidance and sound advice. He brought to bear on the affairs of the Church all his business and professional acumen. He could be a Diplomat, but he could be very straightforward when the situation demanded it. He was a humble man.

HYMN FOR THE MONTH OF SEPTEMBER, 2016 Rev. Dr. Mikie Roberts Director, Provincial Hymnal Committee.



Finally! To God be the glory! As a Province, we give thanks to God that copies of our new hymnal – Caribbean Moravian Praise (CMP) have finally arrived. Their arrival marks the culmination of

years of work on the part of the members of the Provincial Hymnal Committee. As we utilize our new hymnals, we pray that God's Spirit will continue to be made manifest in our corporate and individual worship. For the month of September, our hymn is *The Word of God stands ever fast*. It is hymn #1 in CMP and was originally written by P. Herbert in 1566 and later translated by John Swertner in 1789. The name of the applied tune is *O JESU SICH*.

This hymn lays out for us what can be considered the core elements of God's Word. In the opening stanza we see God's Word as being timeless and powerful. God chose to utilize humankind as the avenue by which His Word would be made known. Consequently, it is intended to be shared for all humanity. God's Word is without boundaries. It is universal. But this hymn also reveals that in its general appeal to all humanity, God's Word exposes the sinfulness of our human nature. Romans 3: 23 underscores the human condition when it says, "all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God." Yet in seeing the gravity of our fallen nature, this same Word of God unfolds before us the magnitude of God's love. The demonstration of this 'wondrous love' is best depicted in the truth that through Jesus Christ, God's Son, humankind can receive the free gift of salvation. That's the Good News! Ours is a generation, when, as believers, we are faced with the temptation to downplay the centrality of God's Word as our divine compass. But as generations before us can attest, God's Word has served as the guiding light for the Church throughout the ages. This hymn reminds us then that in our generation, it is the proclamation of God's almighty Word that will ultimately bring about the change of heart that we desire to see in all people. The final stanza is doxological in structure and draws attention to the eternal nature of God's Word. Since God is eternal so too is God's Word.

The hymn ends with a forward glance down the corridors of eternity to that great hope when we shall live eternally with God because we have allowed the eternal Word of God to dictate and govern our lives.

As we begin a new school year, this hymn is a timely reminder that in the pursuit of academic goals, young and old alike should make the pursuit of God's Word a top priority. Below are the words and music for the hymn of the month for September:

The world we live in is a very dangerous place. Persons are being killed and I daresay slaughtered for their faith in Jesus Christ. There are many terrorists groups which have been wreaking havoc world over. In this scenario, the Church is being called upon to make its presence known and to make an impact in the lives of others.

Grenada Mission

We continue to embrace and celebrate the **Grenada Mission which** continues to be a source of inspiration for the Province. **The members at the mission have grown and are playing a more active role in the development of the work.** The Tobago Conference continued to give lead responsibility for the Mission and must be highly commended for the tremendous role it has been playing. The Province continues to play its part in encouraging, praying for and assisting financially to the growth of the Mission.

This year, 2016 marks 10yrs since the Moravian Church, Eastern West Indies Province, led by the Tobago Conference, officially began Mission Work in Mt. Tranquil, Grenada. While relief work started after the devastation caused by Hurricane Ivan, the first mission trip in July, 2006 was headed by Rev. Rowan Simmons, assisted by Rev. Devon Mannix who was accompanied by the members of the Moravian Young Adult Association (MYA) of Tobago. In recognition of this milestone, the Mission will give God thanks in a special Anniversary Service and Love feast on Sunday 25th September, 2016 under the theme: *"Working for the Advancement of God's Kingdom."*

The Mission has a weekly attendance of between 38 and 45 persons. There is a membership of approximately sixty (60) persons

St. Maarten Moravian Church

The St. Maarten Moravian Church continues to be a collaborative effort between the EWIP and the Suriname Province. The EWIP is responsible for the English language service on the third Sunday of each month. The Church has grown since it got its own building. It has an average attendance at worship of fifty (50) persons. There is a membership of approximately eighty (80) persons.

<u>Tortola Fellowship</u>

The Tortola Fellowship continues to function and we need to pray for and remember them as they continue to make an impact in that territory. It has not been easy, but we thank God for Rev. Erflin and Sister Marleen Browne who have been charged with the responsibility to continue to develop and strengthen that fellowship. With the call of the new Pastor, there has been renewed energy and there is all indication that the fellowship is poised for growth. The Unity Offering 2016 will go towards the development of the Ministries at the Tortola Fellowship. The Rev. Alicia Ross-Floyd must be commended for her sojourn at the Fellowship.

Haiti Mission

The Mission in Haiti is a beacon of hope. The Moravian Church in Jamaica and Cayman Islands and the Eastern West Indies Province are jointly Supervising the Haiti Mission. The prospects look good. Presently, there are three congregations have been established. They are, the first Moravian Church, ST. Raphael Moravian Church and Kalbasye Moravian Church. In addition, there are several Fellowships. There are presently two Ministerial Students being trained at UTCWI in Jamaica to return to Haiti to strengthen the work. The British Province must be commended for assisting in the cost for the training of the two Ministerial Students.

Worldwide Mission

The work **in Cuba** continues to be a source of inspiration and is also being supported from our Mission Funds. The Unity Synod 2016 elevated Cuba to the status of a Mission Province. The Mount Tabor Congregation in Barbados must be commended for dedicating some mission funds to this mission annually. This work is now being supervised by the Moravian Church Southern Province, in the USA.

We continue to support the work of the Moravian Church in every angle of the world. There is a budget that is set by the worldwide Moravian Church for each Province to support the mission of the Church. The EWIP has been assessed and contributes over US\$15000.00 annually to support the work of the Worldwide Moravian Mission.

Board of World Mission

We cherish the relationship that we share with the Board of World Mission. We are truly thankful for the cross fertilization of ideas where we can learn from each other. The BWM with its tremendous experience in Mission can teach us many things about mission and how to navigate the many challenges that mission entails. In like manner, we too can teach the BWM about mission in our context. The Rev. Dr. Errol Connor is the EWIP's representative on the BWM. We thank him for his willingness to serve.

Mission in our own Communities

Some congregations have adopted needy families; give scholarships to successful children. Others have decided to feed the homeless, disadvantaged and shut-ins. Some congregations have feeding programs while others have Centres for the distribution of foodstuff and clothing.

Most Conferences continue to use the mass media for the proclamation of the Word of God. Social Media is being widely used by many of our Congregations and many Congregations have Websites which disseminate information on the Church and Ministry. Many programs and Services are carried on Television and Radio. We are challenged to seize every opportunity to touch our communities for God.

cation of the youths in Antigua through its Mathematics Enrichment Program tailored for 4th and 5th formers. This year marked the 6th year of the program which is the brainchild of The Right Rev. Dr. Conrad Spencer. The program ran from 8th to 18th August at Tim O'Reilly Auditorium. There were 36 students from several secondary schools.

Previously, the tutors were Bishop Spencer and Dr. Vanere Goodwin, both professors of Mathematics at the University of the Virgin Islands (UVI). Statistics, Trigonometry and Algebra were the subjects covered. However, with the addition of Sister Corette Samuel, a Math teacher at Glanville's Secondary School, Geometry was added to the program. Dr. Goodwin is now retired from UVI. He is a member of Faith Moravian Church in St. Croix while Sister Samuel is a member of Lebanon Moravian Church in Antigua.

At the closing ceremony at which some parents were present, a representative from each of the two groups of students thanked the organizers and tutors for the knowledge gained. Certificates were distributed to each student. During an informal talk, one student expressed his anxiety of returning to class at the new school year to show off his new knowledge in Mathematics.

UPSIDE DOWN

Scripture Reading: Matthew 5: 38 – 48

Text: You have heard that it was said, "You shall love your neighbor and hate your enemy." But I say to you, love your enemies. Matthew 5: 43 - 44



If you were to ask me who I am, I'd tell you that I'm a follower of Jesus. But I have to admit at times following Him is a real challenge. He tells me to do things like rejoice when I'm persecuted and reviled (according to Matt. 5: 11 - 12 which says "Blessed are you when they revile you and persecute you and shall say all manner of evil against you for my sake. Rejoice and be exceedingly glad"). Persecution here speaks of a very unjust situation where one is treated unfairly over a sustained period, he is telling me to rejoice;

He also tells me to turn the other cheek (vv, 38 - 39, "whosoever slaps you on the right cheek turn the other to him also"), here turning the other cheek reflects that the aggressor is having the better of you by belittling you, making you feel small;

He also says "to give to him who wants to take everything from me, maybe even unjustly so" (vv. 40 - 42), not just my coat but give him my cloak also; He says also for me to love my enemies, bless those who curse me, and do good to those who hate me (vv. 43 - 44) loving of my enemies maybe is not that difficult because this causes me to do some introspection but what about blessing those that curse me and worse yet how do I do good to those that HATE me? Hate here is a very active word with a very negative intent. This kind of lifestyle seems very upside down or very inverted to me.

But I've come to realize that He is not upside down regardless of what he said to me but - I am. We have all been born fallen and broken. Being twisted by sin, our first instincts are often wrong, which inevitably leaves a big mess.

dirty floor of our sinful ways, and turns us right side up. As we follow His right-side-up ways, we discover that turning the other cheek keep us from getting caught in a brawl, we have diffuse a situation that could have been much worse.

That it is more blessed to give than to receive, and that dying to self is life at its best. The reflection of the "me myself and I attitude"is no more, and that I have lived for a much higher and better purpose.

After all, His ways are not our ways (Isaiah 55:8), and I've come to realize that His ways are always best.
