The great commandment is Jesus' marching orders to the church, the called-out people of God, to get busy moving towards to the nations to share the gospel of Jesus Christ. That activity

cannot be localized to a day, a month or a season. Missions is life. For us as Moravian, mission is who we are; the passion that burnt in the veins of our spiritual forebears.

There was also that added element of raising funds to support various purposes including propping up congregation's budget. Missions has graduated to mean many things that are good and vital but not specifically intended under the great commission.

In recent years there is a movement to redefine what we are called to do as church. The term "missional" was introduced to help the church focus again on the great commission as found in Matthew 28. One might ask, "What is a missional church?" Great question! As usual, great questions do not always yield great answers. A missional church is many things. To my mind the missional church calls us to adjust our thinking and acting. We are well accustomed to speaking of the mission of the church. The missional church perspective does not focus on the church's mission but the mission of God, the Missio Dei. To speak of the church's mission is to speak about human endeavour. The mission of God begins with God. The missional church fundamentally believes that the mission of God has a church. The missional church seeks to actively discern what God is doing in the context and follow the lead of God. The mission of God informs everything - polity, worship, stewardship, discipleship among others. In the missional church there is a conversation between, the context, the church and God. The missional church sees itself not as sending but as a sent. It is sent to a broken world to bring a message of redemption, healing, justice, salvation and deliverance. The missional church is multidimensional, responding to the leadership of the Holy Spirit.

So what does this mean for us? Before we become despondent, it is useful to note that we have been this way before. It was the mission of God that led our forebears to unknown paths to share the gospel of Jesus Christ. It was that same mission that caused them to focus on empowerment of people, invest in educating people of African descent and preach the gospel. Those were bold initiatives in their day as people of African descent we not seen as people and therefore uneducable. They came to a broken place to give hope in the light of Jesus.

How can we do that this missionary season? How might we be more missional in our missionary efforts in 2019 and beyond? How might we bring hope to people around us who are marginalized? Are there people around us who have lost their voice and need our voice to be raised up for them? Where can we be present to the people in our various communities? God is not expecting massive programmes from us. God expects us to move away from missions that simply please us to missions that follow what God is doing in our context. For those who care to give this another thought, God will grant sight and insight into ways in which we might connect again to the needs and the people around us. As the mission of God becomes the driving force, survival becomes less of our concern. From this perspective, it will soon be clear that missionary is not a date on a calendar, not just a season but story of our lives. May the mission of God move us forward.

## **Tribute to Rev Dr. Winelle Kirton Roberts**

A Farewell Service was held on Sunday August 28th, 2019 for the Rev. Dr. Winelle Kirton Roberts, at the



Memorial Moravian Church in St. Thomas. This service was attended by Government Officials, University and Community Leaders and Moravian Clergy from across the Islands.

The Moravian Church Eastern West Indies Province is served by many excellent clergy persons.

One of our finest is our sister, Rev Dr. Winelle J Kirton Roberts. From her earliest days at Dunscombe, St. Thomas, Barbados, she has distinguished herself. Her distinction is not of the type of "sounding brass, or tinkling cymbal." Sis Winelle's distinction may be seen in the soundness of her character, the warmth of her heart, the excellence of her academic achievements and the profundity of her spirituality.

Sis Winelle candidate for ministry in the Moravian Church in 1989 and she entered seminary at the United Theological College of the West Indies and the University of the West Indies. From UTCWI and UWI, Sis Kirton Roberts was assigned to the Chaguanas Congregation in central Trinidad for two (2) years before she left to pursue further studies. She returned from academic pursuits to serve the Calvary and Gracehill Moravian Churches in Barbados in 1997. She served that pastorate for Nine (9) years ending on June 30, 2006 when she was called to serve the Memorial Moravian Church along with her husband Rev Dr. Mikie Roberts.

Now, we meet to recognize her dedicated and sterling service to Memorial Moravian Church and the wider St. Thomas community and pray God's favour upon her as she opens another phase of the journey.

One also needs to mention that along the way, Sis Kirton Roberts bore three (3) beautiful girls, attained a PhD, served as Superintendent of the Virgin Islands Conference, wrote an academic book – *Created in their Image* – served as Secretary of the Provincial Elders Conference, served God's people and many other meaningful engagements, too numerous to mention.

To celebrate and recognize this woman of excellence, this woman of God, is easy. To bid her farewell, is not as easy. Her presence and contributions at Moravian staff gatherings, at Provincial Synods and other meetings of the Conference and Province will be acutely missed. This is a bitter sweet moment – our celebration is tainted with a dose of melancholy. Yet still we believe that her steps are ordered of the Lord and that God delights in her ways. We believe that the God who has brought her this far will be there to navigate the course up ahead.

The Moravian Church Eastern West Indies Province wishes you well and intercedes on your behalf that that God will guide your feet to the places ordained for you. Your cup will run over and that which God has deposited in you will feed whom God will place in your path. Remember the holy psalm and walk before God in humility and integrity of heart. "I would advise next year's potential winner to have the mindset from now that there will be many obstacles and hardship: it is not an easy road. But if they do the work and make the sacrifice they can do it," he said (AC)

#### **DURING THE STORM**


- Stay in Secure Room.
- Stay away from windows.
- Do not use the phone, or candles.
- Monitor Weather and Civil Service Bulletins on either regular or NOAA radio.
- Have supplies on hand.
- Remain indoors when the eye moves over your area because the storm will resume shortly.

#### AFTER THE STORM

- Make sure that all is definitely clear outside, and the storm has completely passed before going out.
- Report downed power lines, and stay away from them.
- Use stored water and food.
- Be patient. Things will take a while before they get back to normal.
