I am Moravian...

"What kind of church is the Moravian Church? I have never heard of it."

I am sure that like me, you have been asked this question many times. I am also sure that, like me, you would have struggled to answer this question clearly and precisely. Even though there have been some publications on Moravianism, there has not been any specific document/curriculum to comprehensively address this question until quite recently with the publication of *Our Moravian Treasurers*.

The objective of this article is to educate and empower us to

share our Moravian identity. Knowing who are as Moravians is fundamental to us being able to embody the distinctiveness of the Moravian Church among other churches and in the world.

This legacy must be passed along at it represents the cloth from which we are cut and how we are to live our faith. In this first article I will look at three facets of the Moravian identity, rooted in the teachings of John Hus – the central place of the Bible, the relevance of the gospel, and the power of the Spirit of God.

The spiritual forebear of the Moravian Church was John Hus (Jan Hus). He was a Priest in the Roman Church of the day. He was devoted to his calling and to his God. As Priest, he saw many excesses that ran counter to the requirements of the Bible which is our rule of faith. He was not quiet about his convictions and called the church back to the teaching of the Bible. The church was very powerful and would not allow a lowly Priest from Prague to disrupted its carefully curated system. Hus was targeted and eventually burnt at the stake on July 6, 1415. He had opportunities to backtrack on words spoken during sermons, on ideas written in his books, and on doctrines that he believed. Each opportunity to contradict the Bible and the ways of God was rejected. Hus died because he had a high view of Scripture.

The central place of the Bible is one of the beliefs of Hus and his. As those whose beliefs are based on Hus' teachings, Moravians believe that the Bible is the inerrant word of God. Inerrant does not mean that there are no dictational or production errors. The inerrancy of the Bible means that the message of the Bible is true and that we can live by it. The Bible was not sent verbatim from heaven. The mind and ways of God were spoken through human agents who in turn wrote. Once fallible, human agents were involved in the production of the Bible, there would be some error. Notwithstanding, we believe that the message of God to humanity remains unaltered. This view of Scripture allows us to believe the "Holy Scripture of the Old and New Testaments is the only source of our life and salvation; and this Scripture is the sole standard of the doctrine and faith of the Unitas Fratrum and therefore shapes our lives" (Moravian Church Unity Office, 2019, p. 71).

Even with a high view of scripture, there is the understanding that context affects how some people read and interpret the Bible. "The interpretation of Scripture should be guided by heart and mind, piety and rationality, doing and thinking" (Moravian Church Unity Office, 2019, p. 73).Our Daily Text is a natural outgrowth of the central place of Scripture. Reading Scripture daily exposes the believer to the word which can change hearts and lives. Rather that develop theological statements to govern the church and the life of faith, the Moravian Church relies of the Scripture to give direction on how the church best represents the kingdom of God on the earth and how we live out our commitment to Jesus.

The identity of the Moravian Church is further fleshed out in the application of the gospel to daily life. In John Hus' time when many could not read the Bible, Hus's ministry made the Bible relevant. He helped people to understand that the Bible spoke to them. Hus established himself as a Priest who empathized with the oppressed. The political and social realities were some what hierarchical. The masses in Prague were unhappy with the oppression from the authorities of the time. They felt their rights abused and felt neglected by the political and religious systems. Hus's messages championed their cause based in the truth of Scripture. He wrote in the vernacular the language 2

of the people, so that the laity could understand and respond. He was seen a one of the people. In a time when clergy were part of the upper class, this was revolutionary.

This was also the posture of the missionaries who came to the Caribbean in the earliest part of Moravian missions. The missionaries attempted to identify with those who were enslaved or relegated to the lower echelons of society. There was an understanding of being among the people so that the needs of the people could be better understood and addressed. Admittedly, it was not perfect. However, this was the strategy employed by God when Jesus was incarnated. Jesus came as a baby and grew up in the culture. He was as much a Jew as any other Jew and "was in all points tempted like we are, yet without sin" (Hebrews 4:15). Jesus spoke the language of the people and therefore started a revolution that changed the hearts of people to follow the true and living God. Ministry must be incarnational and that is at the heart of the Moravian Church.

Another distinctive of the Moravian Church is our openness to the movement of the Holy Spirit. Jan Hus said, I preached the sacred Scriptures—not I, but principally the Holy Spirit.' The renewed Moravian Church under the leadership of Zinzendorf was solidly based on the Holy Spirit. We have rehearsed the events of August 13, 1727 continuously so it is very familiar to most. The Spirit of God visited our spiritual forebears and reshaped the trajectory of the church. Those who were once at odds were now at peace. Rather than focus on personal agendas, the kingdom agenda was the singular focus. The Holy Spirit invaded their space, reshaped their hearts and passion, and made room for us in this time and season. Five years missionaries were in St. Thomas, then later, Danish West Indies.

The work of the Holy Spirit sometimes is a point of contention because the movement of the Spirit of God is usually dynamic. At the same time, not all dynamic movements are energized by the Holy Spirit. Having to discern what is and is not authentic, creates uncertainty and skepticism among many. It is important that we understand that the movement of the Holy Spirit is vital to the life of the church and do what is required to ensure we are consistently open to the working of the Holy Spirit.

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The foregoing distinctives have shaped this church over the years. Over time, their influence has been challenged by personal preferences and cultural norms. As we consider our identity as Moravians, we must look back at the experiences that God used to craft this Christian community so that we can continue on that trajectory of the call of God on this church. For sure, there are new revelations and new paths that the Spirit opens for the church. New paths do not erase the effects of the formative experiences. They should be seen as pillars from which we launch to serve to present age.

Our identity as Moravians is formed by the central place of the Bible, by the application of the gospel to daily life, and openness to the movement of the Holy Spirit. We will explore other formative distinctives of the Moravian Church in next month's article.

Ecclesiastes 4:12 reminds us that a threefold cord is not quickly broken. We will do big things as we work together.

The added pillars identified for this period enable us to dig into who we are as Christians and Moravians. The Book of Order 2020 along with the book Moravian Treasurers are valuable resources in making the S.H.I.F.T. real and personal. This also fits into the discipleship thrust in the Province.

For Lent 2023, all staff are called to use the three pillars of the Provincial Theme for the six Sundays of Lent and Easter Sunday. These themes can then be explored further in Bible study to add more flesh to the bones.

Reclaiming our identity, renewing our purpose, and re-igniting our passion. Broadly speaking, renewing identity speaks of who we are as Christ-followers; renewing our purpose speaks to why the church exists; re-igniting our passion speaks to our willingness to share our faith with others.


