### I am Moravian...

This third installment on distinctives of the Moravian Church, will highlight our emphasis on evangelism/outreach and our deep faith in the Triune God. As reminder, we looked at the emphasis on the Bible being central our practice of practical holiness that allows us to connect with people, our openness to the work of the Holy Spirit, and our emphasis on salvation through Jesus.

Another of the distinctives of the Moravian Church would be our emphasis on evangelism. That fact is often repeated and celebrated though not always practiced. It is established fact that

Moravian Church is one of the pioneers in sending missionaries outside of the New Testament. Other churches sent clergy to follow their members. When the missionaries went to St. Thomas in December of 1732, it was as result of the testimony of Anthony Ulrich who was an enslaved man originally from West Africa and brought to the Danish Caribbean to be a slave on the sugar cane plantation. When Zinzendorf spoke with him at a coronation in Denmark about the spiritual condition of the enslaved people in the Caribbean, the report of their inhuman treatment and their exclusion from church did not sit well with Zinzendorf. The situation begged for a response and he invited Anthony to Herrnhut to share his story. When that story was shared others were moved to respond. Leonard Dober and David Nitschmann eventually set out from Germany on August 21, 1732 and arrived in St. Thomas on December 13, 1732. These things are well known.

The Moravian approach to mission is based on six ideas:

- 1. "Souls for the Lamb!" Missions was about preaching the gospel to all who needed to hear and receive Christ.
- 2. Personal faith in Christ was the driving force. Missionaries are to share what they have

experienced in Christ. The witness of the missionary was key.

- 3. Missionaries were to sow the seed of the word and prepare people for the coming kingdom of Christ.
- 4. Missionaries cannot save people. The work of salvation is the work of the Holy Spirit.
- Coercion should be avoided. True conversion is a response of the heart.
- The focus of preaching should be the birth, death, and resurrection of Jesus. It is the person of Jesus that makes the difference for those who will come to believe.

It is useful to ask what has become of the passion for mission and the rallying cry of souls for the Lamb. We need to recapture that part of our DNA so that this church can walk in obedience to the call of God. It is important the church remembers that our existence is about reaching people for Christ and not keeping the doors open. So much of our meetings is about the "business" of church the organization and not the mission of God. It is a difficult balancing act at times. Yet, we must keep that balance if we are to be faithful to the call. The need to emphasize the mission of God is greater now than in previous times. More people are walking away from church believing that they can live without reference to God or church. Our Moravian forebears took on the challenge of mission and went into the places where they felt they were led and shone the light of Christ. If people are going to have that encounter with Jesus again, we must be on mission to witness to the presence and difference of Christ in our lives. This is one of the reasons we have been talking about discipleship. We grow our faith in Christ so that we are better witnesses to Christ. The Moravian Church has always emphasized the need to be practical signposts of the presence of Jesus.

Underlying these distinctives is a deep and abiding faith in the triune God. Our Moravian forebears had a profound belief in God. For them it was not enough to give an intellectual accent of faith in God. That belief had to express itself in the quality of one's life. It was

that faith that kept Hus when he clashed with the church of the day. He knew death was possible, but

he kept going because he believed that God was leading him. The same may be said for the missionaries who came out to the Caribbean and the other mission fields. Dober and Nitschmann did not have a receiving agency to meet them but they came because they believed that God would make a way where there seemed to be no way. They stepped out in faith.

It was that faith in God that so impressed John Wesley when he shared space with the Moravians on a

ship heading to America. A storm buffeted the ship and death at sea seemed to be their fate. There were screams of terror when a wave inundated the ship and poured water into the cabins. During the turbulence, the Moravians maintained a posture of worship, singing songs of praise to God. They believed that God would bring them out, and even if they died, they were convinced of eternal rest with God — God was consistently present with them. Their faith was not an accessory in their lives; it was more than an oaken staff on which they leaned. Their faith was a ship that carried them through life. Their faith caused them to challenge the status quo and leave the rest to God.

When someone asks about the Moravian Church and we tell the person that this division of the body of Christ is characterized by its emphasis on personal faith in Christ for salvation, focuses on mission and evangelism, and operates on a deep, abiding faith in God, what should that mean for you? None of us wants to think that we have betrayed our heritage. However, we need to give urgent attention to how we live what has been passed on to us. There is an urgent need to add our stories to these stories so that decades from now, the lines can be traced from our spiritual forebears to us, and to those who come behind us. The Moravian distinctives are not for bragging rights. They are biblical standards by which we are called to live.

What is your confession as a Christian and Moravian? Do you have a passion for souls or pursue that deep faith in God? Let us reclaim that identity.

# A BRIEF HISTORY OF CANA MORAVIAN CHURCH By Rev. Dr. Cortroy Jarvis

What we now know as Cana Moravian congregation has its roots in Gracehill congregation in Liberta. Based on the report for Gracehill



written by Br. J. L. Harvey covering the year 1862, ten meeting places or bible classes were established on the neighbouring estates and villages. One of these was in Swetes where many members of Gracehill resided. This was on a plot of land which was earlier given to the Mission for the purpose of a burial ground. A chapel-school was erected on this site where six persons had already been buried. This bible class quickly gained congregation status, The chapel was opened for worship on 25th February, 1863, and day school commenced 5 days later on 2nd March with Br. Jacobs as its head. The first pastor of this new congregation was the Reverend James LaTrobe Harvey.

We do not know how the name was arrived at, except that in his 1872 report on Gracehill, the Rev James Turner wrote: "in addition to the ordinary services, three meetings of a social character have been held for raising means for local purposes. Two were held in the Station School, and one in the school at Swetes Village, which in future will be known by the name of Cana, and it was recorded in 1884 that its funds were used for the enlargement of the school room at Swetes".

The minister's report for 1886 states, the work at Cana has been carried on as usual. During the year a new roof was put on to the chapel at the cost of £50 of which £15 was given by the Executive Board. The balance was raised locally. Bro. Emanuel George as head teacher at the school gave good support to the minister in ensuring spiritual and material growth, and an all round development for the children under his care. He formed the first choir at Cana, a tuning fork being the only instrument.

Although Cana was recognized as a full-fledged congregation in 1863, its apron string was still tied to Gracehill whose pastor continued to minister to its needs. It was not until the 1920's that regular Sunday services began there. However, baptisms receptions, confirmations and weddings for its members continued to be performed at Gracehill. It was from 1948 that baptisms and confirmations were administered at Cana. Wedding ceremonies were conducted at

Cana only after the dedication of its present building in 1959. Gracehill and Cana continued as one pastorate until 1952 when Cana was served by ministers of Greenbay and of Cedar Hall.

When the building located at its original site in St. Anns was becoming unfit for worship, the congregation decided on the building of a new place of worship. In exchange for lands in Old Road, the government gave the Moravians a plot of land adjacent to the government school, nicknamed Joshua Long Hall by the villagers. The school building became the interim place of worship during the construction of this building. Construction work under the guidance of the late Br. Samuel Benjamin, a member of Cana, lasted for under one year. It started in 1958 and was completed in 1959. The pastor at that time was Rev Allan W. Osbourne. On Sunday 25th January 1959, this building was dedicated to God's glory by the Rt. Rev. Peter M. Gubi, who at the time was serving in St. Kitts. The Antigua Star newspaper of 27th January, 1959 in reporting on the dedication service stated, the seating capacity of 450 was well exceeded early in the afternoon.

Once fully established from a Bible class, Cana continued to show clear signs of growth, and developed into a small congregation as an outstation of Gracehill to a much larger unit with Sunday School, Women's Fellowship, Men's Fellowship, youth groups, adult, youth and junior choirs, a dance group, girl's guides and brownies, and a boy's brigade.

For much of the early years, Cana relied heavily on the services of lay pastors. These included the Brethren Emanuel George, Albert Peters, Charles Williams, Ernest Williams, Reginald Samuel, and more recently the Brethren Joseph Charles and Victor Williams. Over these 160 years, the congregation have been served by about 30 pastors, three of whom, George Oliver Maynard, John E. Knight and Neville C Brown became bishops of the Unity. In his book, **The Emergence of a Bishop**, Bishop Brown who pastored Cana from 1951 to 1952, and again after his consecration, tilled its 3rd chapter, **The Best Wine Last.** This is in reference to Cana where he last served. He might be hinting that Cana was the best congregation that he had pastored, and that the experience there had a great impact on him.

In the book, he refers to Cana as a "medium size congregation with extra large size aspirations. He continues, she is blessed with a group of efficient, committed

In addition to him, God has blessed Cana in producing as servants in his vineyard Glenville Gregory, Eulencine Christopher né Richards, Algernon Lewis, Jeremy Francis, Nigel Daniel, Rowan Simmons and Nevin Lewis. All of whom have made Cana proud. Cana's first product as pastor became chairman of the Provincial Elders Conference of the Eastern West Indies Province of the Moravian Church, and then chairman of the Unity Board. It is no coincidence that another of Cana's son is the current chairman of the Provincial Elders Conference.

The walls of Jerusalem were rebuilt because the people had a mind to work. This mind was evident in Cana throughout the last 160 years, and hopefully will continue into succeeding generations.


