As we reflect on the above theme for Child Month, our reflection will be based the

following scripture - "Train up a child in the way he should go and when he is old, he will not depart from it." - Proverbs 22:6.

Responsibilities of the Parents, Family and Church

Parents must commit themselves to Godly training and discipline of their children. Christian training has its purpose - the dedication of our children to God and His will, accomplished by separating them from evil influences of the world and by instructing them in Godly conduct. Parents must encourage their children to seek God for themselves and thus enjoy genuine spiritual experiences they will never forget.

The general principle is that a properly-trained child will not depart from the Godly ways taught by his or her parents. However, that is not an absolute guarantee that all children of God-fearing parents will remain true to God and His Word. When living in an evil society, where many of God's people are themselves unfaithful, the children of Godly parents can be influenced to sin and to give into temptation. In Ezekiel 14:14-20, God speaks of the abandonment of a belief or principle so great that even righteous men like Noah, Daniel and Job could not save their own sons and daughters. The parents' responsibility



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is to instruct their children in the ways of God (Luke 1:17; 12:34-30). Parents are to turn the hearts of their children to love, and the disobedient to the wisdom of God and to make them people prepared for the Lord.

This is a clear statement as the foremost goal of the gospel is to re-establish God's will for the family, through the following steps. Parents in raising their children must encourage, as well as correct, punish only intentional wrong-doing, instruct with patience, and dedicate their lives in love to them with a heart of compassion, kindness, humility gentleness and patience (Colossians 3: 12-14, 21).

1. Lead your children to a life of Godliness in Christ;

- 2. Dedicate your children to God at the beginning of their lives (1 Samuel 1:28, Luke 2:22);
- 3. Teach your children to fear the Lord, turn them away from evil and lead them to righteousness;
- 4. Teach them to obey you as their parents; and
- 5. Protect your children from ungodly influences.

In every generation, each person has a choice

It may seem surprising when children do not follow their parent's example of faith in God. Equally unexpected is a person with deep commitment to Christ who emerges from a family where faith was not present. In every generation, each person has a choice, even though a person seems indifferent towards the faith so precious to his or her parents, God is still at work. Things can change in later years and seeds of faith may spring to life in generations to come. No matter what the family situation may be, we know that the Lord is good and His love endures forever; his faithfulness continues through all generations. (Psalm 100:5).

Tomorrow's world – The Legacy

Children are a heritage of the Lord (Psalm 127:3), all children must be viewed as gifts of God requiring wise and faithful stewardship. Only as the Lord's ways and commandments are accepted, taught and followed by the parents, will children experience God's full blessings. The Church's future Ministry is putting families right with God and each other. There can be no blessing from God or abundant life in the Spirit if God's people do not make family, authority, love and faithfulness absolute priorities in the Church. The purity and righteousness of the home must be maintained or our congregations will fail.

Prayer: Dear Lord, we bring to Thee the children and youth of our homes and schools. Arouse them to diligence in the morning of life. Fill them with the spirit of honour and reverence. Preserve them in honesty and integrity. Keep them in purity and health. Do guide them in all their thoughts, words and deeds. Allow the example of their Saviour to be their pattern in life and death. Accept our petitions, and hear and help us gracious Lord and God. Amen.

It may be tempting to purchase or download copied games, but this is unlawful and it also requires you to make changes to your computer in order to play these games - which can of course damage your computer and expose you to unsuitable content and viruses affecting your system. Make sure you install a valid and up-todate Antivirus, with malware protection.

Ask questions at the Store when purchasing games, and get familiar with the age-rating system at the front and/or back of games packaging.

- > If you are active on social networking sites, set your privacy setting to limit who can see your content. If chatting to people or posting things online, make sure you keep your personal information private; such things as address, phone numbers, passwords, etc
- > Ideally, passwords should be long with random upper- and lower-case letters, numbers and symbols. Do not include your personal details like name, birthday, etc. (Random Tips)



Who would you call an 'UNSUNG HERO/HEROINE OF THE BIBLE'?

This Month's "Unsung" Hero/Heroine is ... A Young Herald

This month's '*unsung*' person of the Bible is a heroine, and a young one too! As we celebrate Child Month we present someone who is young. This young female remained nameless throughout the relatively short record in **2 Kings 5:1-19**, where it is recorded that she had been forcibly taken from her Godly Hebrew home – one in which God is honoured, and His humble servant Elisha revered. Now in her home of captivity in Syria, this little maiden would have been counted among "the spoils of war" and she was secured by Naaman as a servant for his wife. This captive youth was brought to live among idolaters, but **like Daniel and the three Hebrew boys, she clung to her own faith in the living God,** and she was clearly not ashamed nor afraid to demonstrate her knowledge of Him.

Oh how we grumble at the slightest misadventure! But hers was a faith enabling her to live without any record of her grumbling about any feeling of homesickness in an alien land, and clearly without any resentment towards her undesired status or her captors. All that was recorded that she said was just one single sentence – "Would God my Lord were with the prophet that is in Samaria! for he would recover him of his leprosy". This young slave was a Herald! Her love for God inspired her to show love for her masters and although only a maid, this Godly girl did not feel she was too unimportant to share the Good News and influence others for the Lord God Almighty she had known and loved in her now distant Hebrew home.

While Naaman's wife was not known to be a follower of Almighty God, she must have been at her wits end and at the same time have some measure of respect for the faith of her maid who must have lived it out in her home of captivity. Naaman's wife therefore told her leprosy-stricken husband – a reputed mighty man of valour; a captain of the host of the King of Syria - the good news her maid of the land of Israel had so fearlessly and positively declared. This great soldier must too have been anxious for relief for himself and his wife, and in some way too he must have had some measure of respect for this God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob – possibly having been influenced by this young maid's countenance in his home, either through his wife's reports, through his own observation, or from other sources – but he believed and acted on what the captive maid had said, and shared her testimony of faith with his ruler. This maid's sphere of influence now spread at very high levels as this ruler, sent and asked the King of Israel that Elisha might be allowed to cure his decorated diseased commander from the other side.

One Word in season with the power to touch several lives - Naaman's wife, Naaman, the Syrian King, the King of Israel and his ... who had witnessed him rent his clothes. That one Word in season also touched Elisha, and his servant Gehazi (who was sent to convey Elisha's message for healing that if Naaman desired to be cured of his leprosy he must bathe himself seven times in the muddy water of Jordan). Also touched by that one Word were the servants who travelled with Naaman and had witnessed his wounded pride, and encouraged him to follow the instructions, and who also witnessed the immediacy of Naaman's healing upon submission. All men and women, like us, with the choice of how to respond in the circumstance!

Although somewhat humiliated by his 'lack of reception' by Elisha for a man of his stature, when his temper cooled Naaman, reminded of the faith of this nameless, captive slave girl, chose to respond by carrying out the prophet Elisha's instructions, and his choice was blessed. (Gehazi's choice of running after the silver and garments that Elisha refused was not blessed. (*see 2 Kings 5:20-27*). Naaman not only returned home completely healed, but also no longer a worshiper of idols, but a worshiper of The Most High God, having confessed his faith to Elisha: "Behold, now I know that there is no God in all the earth, but in Israel:...". No doubt, following Naaman's return, his entire household, like him, must have come to worship Almighty God.

What is the message of this heroine from this record? **Despite being captive this young maiden remained true to her God in an idolatrous household.** Like a Herald she sounded the news of the Power of Almighty God to Heal, and left the rest to Jehovah Rapha – 'the God who Heals'. This must be the message to us today.

God can heal the situations in our lives – just continue to serve Him in all things; speak His Word in love, in season; and leave the rest up to "I AM that I AM" – the One True God for every situation.

From the Pastor's

Desk

Jesus taken up into Heaven' (Acts 1:1-11)

Greetings and once again welcome to the Pastor's Desk where I share God with you. Particularly, I will look at the **Ascension of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ** in depth for our spiritual understanding and growth in grace. It is titled "**Jesus taken up into Heaven**" and my text is Acts 1:1-11.

Just a few weeks ago we celebrated the period of Lent, and Easter - of our risen Lord. After His resurrection, Jesus remained on earth for forty days and ministered to His disciples. He had already opened their minds to understand the Old Testament message about Himself (*Luke 24:44-48*), but there were other lessons they needed to learn before they could launch out in their new ministry for Christ. Jesus appeared and disappeared during those forty days, and the believers never knew when He might show up. It was excellent preparation for the Church because the days were soon coming when He would no longer be on earth to instruct them personally. We believers, Christians today, never know when our Lord may return, so our situation is somewhat similar to theirs.

The Lord taught them several important lessons during that time of His special ministry and I share these lessons with you. Firstly, the reality of His resurrection (v. 3). Some of the believers may have had their doubts forty days before (*Mark 16:9-14*), but there could be no question now that Jesus had indeed been raised from the dead. To strengthen their faith, He gave them "many infallible proofs" which Luke did not explain. We know that when Jesus met His disciples, He invited them to touch His body, and He even ate before them (*Luke 24:38-43*). Whatever proofs He gave, they were convincing.

Further to this, faith in His resurrection was important to the Church because their own spiritual power depended on it. Also, the message of the Gospel involves the truth of the Resurrection (Romans 10:9-10; 1 Corinthians 15:1-8); and, if Jesus were dead, the Church would be speechless. Finally, the official Jewish position was that the disciples had stolen Jesus' body from the tomb (Matthew 28:11-15), and the believers had to be able to refute this as they witnessed to the Nation. These believers were chosen to be special witnesses of Christ's resurrection, and that was the emphasis in their ministry (Acts 1:22; 2:32; 3:15; 5:30-32). Most of the people in Jerusalem knew that Jesus of Nazareth had been crucified, but they did not know that He had been raised from the dead. By their words, their walk, and their mighty works, the believers told the world that Jesus was alive! This was 'the sign of Jonah!' that Jesus had promised to the Nation (*Matthew 12:38-41*) - His death, burial, and resurrection.

Secondly, the coming of His Kingdom (v. 3). This refers to the reign of God over the hearts and lives of those who have trusted Him (Matthew 6:33; Romans 14:17; 1 John 3:1-9). When you read the four Gospels, you discover that the Apostles had a strongly political view of the Kingdom and were especially concerned about their own positions and privileges. Being loyal Jews, they longed for the defeat of their enemies and the final establishment of the glorious Kingdom under the rule of King Messiah. They did not realize that there must first be a spiritual change in the hearts of the people (Luke 1:67-79). Jesus did not rebuke them when they "kept asking" about the future Jewish Kingdom (Acts 1:7). After, He opened their minds to understand the Scriptures (Luke 24:44) so they knew what they were asking. God has not revealed His timetable to us, and it is futile for us to speculate. The important thing is not being curious about the future, but to be busy in the present sharing the message of God's spiritual Kingdom. This is another emphasis in the Book of Acts (Acts 8:12; 14:22; 20:25; 28:23,31).

Thirdly, the power of His Holy Spirit (vv. 4-8). John the Baptist had announced a future baptism of the Holy Spirit (Matthew 3:11; Mark 1:8; Luke 3:16; John 1:33; & Acts 11:16), and now that prophecy would be fulfilled. Jesus had also promised the coming of the Spirit (John 14:16-18,26; 15:26-27; 16:7-15). It would be an endowment of power for the disciples so that they would be able to serve the Lord and accomplish His will (Luke 24:49). John had spoken about "the Holy Spirit and fire," but Jesus said nothing about fire. Why? Because the "baptism of fire" has to do with future judgment when the Nation of Israel will go through tribulation (Matthew 3:11-12). The appearing of "tongues of fire" at Pentecost (Acts 2:3) could not be termed a baptism. A key verse for us as Christians can be found in Acts 1:8. To begin with, it explains that the power of the Church comes from the Holy Spirit and not from man - not even the higher positions within the Church's administration - not the Bishop, Pastor or anyone who has been given pastoral responsibility over God's people. Hence, as revealed in Zechariah 4:6, God's people experienced repeated fillings of the Spirit as they faced new opportunities and obstacles (Acts 2:4; 4:8,31; 9:17; 13:9). Ordinary people were able to do extraordinary things because the Spirit of God was at work in their lives. The Ministry of the Holy Spirit is not a luxury; it is an absolute necessity.

Emphatically, the word "Witness" is a key word in the Book of Acts and is used twenty-nine times as either a verb or a noun. A "Witness" is somebody who tells what he has seen and heard (*Acts 4:19-20*). When you are on the witness stand in court, the judge is not interested in your ideas or opinions; he only wants to hear what you know first-hand. Our English word 'martyr' comes from the Greek word translated "witness", and many of God's people have sealed their "Witness" by laying down their lives.

We hear a great deal these days about "soul winning", and the emphasis is a good one. However, while some of God's people have a calling to evangelism (Ephesians 4:11), all of God's people are expected to be witnesses and tell the lost about the Saviour. Not every Christian can bring a sinner to the place of faith and decision 'though most of us could do better', but every Christian can bear faithful witness to the Saviour. "A true witness delivereth souls" (Proverbs 14:25). Acts 1:8 also gives us a general outline of Acts as it describes the geographical spread of the Gospel: from Jerusalem (Acts 1-7) to Judea and Samaria (Acts 8-9), and then to the Gentiles and to the ends of the earth (Acts 10-28). No matter where we live, as Christians we should begin our "Witness" at home and then extend it "into all the world". As Dr. Oswald J. Smith said, "The light that shines the farthest will shine the brightest at home".

Finally, the assurance of His coming again (vv. 9-11). Our Lord's ascension into heaven was an important part of His Ministry, for if He had not returned to the Father, He could not have sent the promised gift of the Holy Spirit (John 16:5-15). Also, in heaven today, the Saviour is our interceding High Priest, giving us the grace that we need for life and service (Hebrews 4:14-16). He is also our Advocate before the Father, forgiving us when we confess our sins (1 John 1:9-2:2). The exalted and glorified Head of the Church is now working with His people on earth and helping them accomplish His purposes (Mark 16:19-20). As the believers watched Jesus being taken up to glory, two angels appeared and gently rebuked them. Angels play an important role in the Ministry described in Acts, just as they do today, even though we cannot see them (Acts 5:19-20; 8:26; 10:3-7; 12:7-10,23; 27:23). The angels are the servants of the saints (Hebrews 1:14).

The two messengers gave the believers assurance that Jesus Christ would come again, just as He had been taken from them. This seems to refer to His public "coming in clouds" (*Matthew 24:30; 26:64; Revelation 1:7*) rather than to His coming for His church in a moment "in the twinkling of an eye" (*1 Corinthians 15:51-52; 1 Thessalonians 4:13-18*). Regardless of what news different people may take of God's prophetic programme, Christians agree that Jesus is coming again and that He can come at any time. This in itself is a great motivation for faithful Christian service (*Luke 12:34-48*). Amen.

<u>Prayer</u>:

Father, be to us an inspiration of hope. We pray that by your Holy Spirit we will submit our will to Yours and be faithful witnesses of You as we 'advance your Kingdom'; 'use Your keys'. Amen.

This Month in Moravian History

A HISTORY OF MORAVIAN MUSIC

When the Moravians settled in Bethlehem in 1742, Count Nicholas von Zinzendorf carefully chose the inhabitants of this new community according to their skills so they could contribute to the mission work of this new village. Therefore, it was not accidental that many of the leaders, artisans and workers were also musicians. The first



pipe organ of Bethlehem was installed in 1746, small orchestra was already founded in 1748, and in 1754, a complete choir of trombones (soprano, alto, tenor, and bass) was sent to the new colony, and the Moravian Trombone Choir was created. This unique ensemble still performs regularly and can be seen at least once every month playing hymn

chorales from the belfry of Central Moravian Church.

Christian Gregor (1723-1801) is known as the "Father of Moravian Church music" and was responsible for the first Moravian hymnal, the *Choralbuch* of 1784. Many of the early American Moravian clergy were also composers, and created many favorite Moravian hymns that are still sung today including "Sing Hallelujah, Praise the Lord," composed by Bishop John Christian Bechler (1784-1857). **One of the traditions that began with Count Zinzendorf was that of the Singstunde or a song service, where the pastor would begin singing various hymns, and the sermon was presented through the texts of the hymns.** For the organist, it meant that 400 hymns had to be memorized and readily transposed into whatever key the pastor began singing.

Although most Moravian music was religious in nature, there were lighter moments as evidenced by the presence of the early 19th century Moravian Water Music. Although no longer continued, for many years, on Whit Monday, a large flat-bottomed boat would sail down the then-peaceful Lehigh River. On this boat would be a group of five or six musicians (generally two clarinets, two French horns, and two bassoons) who would serenade the hundreds of listeners on the banks of the Lehigh with water music composed by the Moravian composer and virtuosi violinist, David Moritz Michael.

Because of the close connection of early American Moravians to their European roots, the Moravians had access to contemporary music being composed in Europe. Haydn's "The Creation" was performed for the first time in the United States in the Sanctuary of Central Moravian Church in 1811, and the first complete performance of Bach's Mass in B Minor was presented at Central in 1900, thus giving Central Moravian Church status as a National Landmark of Music. *For more information contact the Moravian Music Foundation at <u>www.moravianmusic.org.</u>*

Our first impulse is to sing – words alone can't express the great joy we know when we feel God's love shown to us in the life, sufferings, death and resurrection of our Saviour. Listening to others isn't enough. God has given to the Moravian Church a heart for music, and special gifts in composing music, writing words, and singing and playing from the heart.

On this Sunday, set aside for us to recognize the value that our music has played in our worship and in our lives, we are thankful that God gave us this gift, this peculiar phenomenon that certain ways of **combining sounds**, **pitches and rhythms and words**, **can touch our hearts as well as our minds**, **can express things**



which mere words cannot, and can draw us closer to one another and to our God. ...

The value of the music program in your church does not depend

upon numbers. It depends upon the hearts of those involved. And the most significant part of the music program of any congregation is not its choir, or band, or even its music staff – it's the congregation itself. The congregation itself is the "first choir". The richness of Moravian music arises from the hearts of those who practice it, and in their connection to the Lord. Visitors to Moravian congregations feel this and are moved by it.

We thank God for the many composers throughout the **Eastern West Indies Province** who over the years have used their God-given gifts to enrich God's Church and bless His people. We especially thank God for all of our musicians who make our worship come alive and cement our faith. May the music of today's service fill your heart and soul with gratitude for God's gifts to the Moravian Church and with renewed dedication to service in the name of our Saviour, Jesus Christ.

THE POWER OF VISION by Rev. Dr. Vincent Miller

"Where there is no revelation, people cast off restraint; but blessed is the one who heeds wisdom's instruction." (Proverbs 29:18 – NIV)."

When I read this proverb, I remembered that God spoke often to His people through dreams and visions. God spoke to Abraham in a dream or vision and told him to leave Haran and take his family to the country of Palestine. By vision also God gave the prophets His message to convey to the people of Israel.

However, this proverb was written for both the individual and the Nation. The writer stresses the fact that all personal and national progress is achieved when individuals received and understand God's Word. Understanding God's revelation is especially important for those in leadership positions.

I like Eugene Petersen's translation of the original Greek text: "If people can't see what God is doing, they stumble all over themselves; But when they attend to what He reveals, they are most blessed." My observation is that Bethlehem Moravian Church is the fulfilment of a vision that God gave an individual, who shared the vision with others, who then approved the vision. The result is the erecting of a worship center, where God is worshiped, the gospel is preached, and individuals are nurtured into fellowship with Jesus Christ as disciples of Christ. Later, a Fellowship Hall was built to expand the congregation's outreach, and to strengthen its mission of making disciples of Jesus Christ.

Today, what is God calling us to become and to do in this time of social and economic change? Another way of putting it is, where do we go from here? How do we respond to Jesus' command to 'make disciples of all people' in our ever-changing society?

God's people need to engage in a period of Bible study, prayer and discernment to seek God's way forward. Out of this exercise will come the revelation from God. After wrestling with the vision, a consensus will emerge, indicating that this is what God is calling us to be and to do. Let us remember that God gives us the vision. Vision guides to where God is leading us. It is the overriding idea of what the Church should be. It is God who shows us what kind of Church we can and ought to be. Vision, like the star that guided the wise men to the Christ-child, shows us the way forward to the place where God wants us to be. Seek God's vision for the Church and follow it.

God, in Christ, has already given the Church its Mission: To make disciples of all peoples Matt. 28:19-20. How we carry out the mission, our strategy, will vary from time to time. As the community changes, so will the strategies we use to win people to Jesus Christ. Scriptures that inform our minds include:

The Vision: Matthew 5:48: "Be perfect, therefore, as your heavenly Father is perfect." (2). Ephesians 4:4-6: "There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called to one hope when you were called; one Lord, one faith, one baptism; one God and Father of all, who is over all and through all and in all." (3) 1 Corinthian 12: 1-11 (Concerning Spiritual Gifts).

<u>The Mission</u>: Matt.28:19-20: "Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely, I am with you always, to the very end of the age."

As we celebrate **Moravian Music Sunday** a quick look at the Moravian Church's **VISION** in the area of Music we see there is much to recognise within our Province and Conference. This Child Month, as we focus on our Youth, we zero in on:

The Moravian Disciples - "A VISION",

but there are other areas within our Conference:

- the Moravian Music Academy another Vision realised at congregations in the Barbados Conference -Bethlehem being one such congregation;
- The Moramus Singers of Barbados;

the Calvary Steel Pan Orchestra – also a Vision; and, as a Province:

- having a Minister of Music was itself a Vision.
- producing the Caribbean Moravian Praise Hymnal
 another Vision (to name just two).
- There are other Choirs, Chorales, and Performers across the Barbados Conference keeping our members actively involved in the Work of Ministry through song, music, and expressions in dance, including our Bethlehem Liturgical Dance Group.

There are yet other ways to carry out the Mission – that Great Commission to 'go and make disciples of all'. Let's get involved – let it not be said "It's our Omission".

Indeed we are called together to function as one body and one Spirit, called to one hope - one Lord, one faith, one baptism; one God and Father of all. "SHARE THE VISION OF OUR LORD"

Out of a Vision A Youth Chorale was born – *The* Moravian Disciples.

The Chorale was founded in April 1996 with a membership of twelve teenagers representing congregations within the Conference. Today, membership stands at twenty-four and have included some very keen juniors, along with the other teen-aged and young adult members. The Chorale was formally initiated on January 18, 1997 (at its Inaugural Concert); and has since held annual Concerts on the third Saturday in January.

The Chorale's mission then and now is to "Win Souls for Christ", done mainly through its music ministry. The emphasis of its music is on originality and creativity – with over 100 original songs written and arranged by its members. In 1999 the Chorale released an Audio Cassette titled "Celebrate".



Overall the group's repertoire focuses on Contemporary and Caribbean rhythms ranging from reggae, calypso, R&B, to the traditional church harmonies and chants. Original pieces have also focused on our Moravian heritage and one such song is now included in the new **Caribbean Moravian Praise Hymnal** for the Eastern West Indies and Jamaica Provinces. That song, titled "**Rallying Around the** Lamb" is #734 in the new Hymnal.

"Moravians the war is still raging, there are still many souls to save. Moravians look at our heritage, let's not fall to disgrace. Stand up now and be counted, and spread the gospel news to all, Our mission here can never end as long as people live in sin."

In 2003, after seven years in existence, the Moravian Disciples were **Finalist in CBC's GospelFest Singing Competition in the Chorale category**. For two successive years (2003 & 2004) the Chorale was nominated for the annual ceremony for Gospel music in Barbados – the Flame Gospel Artiste Award. Then in 2007/8 the Moravian Disciples was recognised as "Chorale of the Year" and received the coveted **"Flame Gospel Artiste Award"**. In 2008, the Chorale was also nominated at the national level and climbed to the **Semi-Finals in the National Independence Festival of Creative Arts (NIFCA) in the Chorale category**. In 2013 the Chorale was a **Finalist in the CITA Radio Song Contest**.

Together, with its Manager, the Chorale makes plans for its tours and annual concerts, including the themes. They also share in decisions on uniform, song selection and presentation. The Chorale consists of a band of its own musicians who support their presentations on keyboard, drums, guitar, etc. For a number of years the group has also incorporated drama into their Concerts, which were very well received.

With all the distractions for today's youth, this Chorale has held it together and daily reclaimed its focus on Almighty God and sharing the Good News of Salvation and new life in Christ.

The Chorale's Manager, founder and leading song-writer is Mr. Andrew Parris.

"I possessed a tremendous love for writing poetry throughout my youth. Although the compositional strategies of poets differ from that of lyricists, it was during those early years that the seed was planted in my heart that someday I would convert my poetry to song-

writing. Songs are great teachers, and music is a universal language. I believe that any music

by which the Word of God can be carried must be acceptable to our worship. I truly love the Lord and the Word of God says "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature" (*Mark* 16:15) and I believe that must be shared in the universal language of the people of



"all the world. While I do not consider myself a musician

I seem to possess a 'good ear for music' which allows me to motivate and challenge our singers and musicians to always work at improving their craft, reaching for higher standards and productivity, and to always be creative and innovative as they seek to Advance God's Kingdom through the arts - through song, through music."

The Chorale's other key activities through the years included tours to Antigua, Tobago, Canada (Toronto), and Trinidad. The next challenge for this now 20-year old Chorale, with God's guidance, is embarking on a drama production. Two members of Bethlehem are current members of this thriving Chorale – **The Moravian Disciples** – Bro. Kevin Yarde and Sis. Analacia (*Paul*) Yarde. Let us give our support.

Truths/Tips... Something For Every Age

PERSONAL SECURITY AND PRIVACY

Privacy and safety go together because you use one to help with the other. ...In general, a lot of trouble can be avoided if you don't give out unnecessary information. For example:

- If you live on your own or are a single parent, there is no need to stress that to people you don't know anything about.
- If you are going to be on holiday for a week, and your home or apartment will be empty, then don't tell the whole social gathering where you live (that is exactly how burglars pick up useful information).
- If your collection of stamps is valuable, then as proud as you are of them, don't pass this information on routinely to absolutely everyone.

You may think these points are obvious, but I'm astonished at the number of conversations I hear or over-hear when people are (apparently without concern) giving away this kind of information to groups of people or around others in public places, or over the telephone to virtual strangers. You can't imagine it? How about this:

- "I need a quote on the kitchen so you'll need to come by the house to measure up – but it'll have to be the week after next because I'll be travelling to Italy until then."
- "I know it's summer vacation time, but could you come in the evening please, because I'll be at work all day and my teenaged girls will be the only ones here during the day."
- "I only get to wear this ring when I'm on break from school, otherwise it's kept in my Mom's safe behind her favourite painting in the"

This is not to promote a paranoid attitude, but one that's <u>reasonably</u> CAREFUL. Of course, most people aren't criminals, and aren't "out to get you", but it doesn't do any harm to BE DISCRETE!

"OLD" FASHIONED MANNERS? Old Rule : New Rule

OLD RULE: Men always open doors for women <u>**NEW RULE:**</u> Whoever is leading the way, or is stronger or more capable of opening the door, does so. So you, whether man or woman, hold the door for those who are elderly or disabled, or carrying small children or shopping – it doesn't matter what sex they are either. Otherwise whoever goes first passes through, then holds the door a moment longer to help the next through. Anyone who has been helped in this way says "THANK YOU".

OLD RULE: Men rush around a car (which naturally they have been driving), opens the door like a chauffeur for a female passenger

NEW RULE: The driver – male or female – opens the door from the outside for a passenger to climb in. At the end of the journey, the driver would open the door for and generally help an older or infirm passenger, but generally could safely assume most people can cope on their own.

OLD RULE: Men give up their seats on public transport to women.

<u>NEW RULE</u>: Younger, fit people of either sex give up their seats to those less able to cope because of age, ill health, pregnancy, or heavy burdens.

OLD RULE: Men stand up when a lady enters or leaves a room.

NEW RULE: In a restaurant, a host or partner may rise to greet a new arrival, organise a seat and perhaps pull out a chair. There is no need for others to rise if the new arrival sits down immediately. At a semiformal gathering when a new person arrives, or anyone leaves, it is normal for all guests to stand for greetings and farewells. This avoids exchanges between a standing and a seated person, which may have a way of being embarrassing. Of course, it is perfectly reasonable for someone to remain seated because of a medical problem or simply old age.
