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Keep Focus on God

"Remember now your Creator in the days of your youth." Ecclesiastes 12:1

At this time of the year, we focus on the youth and their activities. To make sure that they remain gainfully employed; we enroll them in Summer Camps, Vacation Bible Schools or selected Sports Programme.

The focus for this devotion is Vacation Bible School where children are taught about God through His Holy Scriptures. The first verse in Ecclesiastes chapter 12 tells the youth exactly what to do while they are young.

The word 'remember ' means do not forget, meditate on, do not lose sight of, keep focus. What could it be that you are to remember that is so important at this time of your life? The verse says 'Your Creator' – Almighty God – the One who made you, who loves you and cares for you.

There are many examples in the Bible to show and encourage youth how to respond to and learn about God. For example: The Creation (Genesis 1,2); Naaman the leper. (2 Kings 5:1-19) David the shepherd boy. (1 Samuel 16:1-13)

As a child I used to go to Children's Service on Thursday evenings. There we would pray, sing, read the Bible, learn many verses and psalms like John 3:16 *(For God so*

love the world...) and Psalm 23 *(The Lord is my Shepherd...).* This helped us in our daily lives to relate to others, solve problems, and respond to difficult situations with God's help. Hence, children should be encouraged to get to know God and His Word, and to make Him a part of their lives. So let us keep focus as we seek to train up our children in the way they should go (Proverbs 22:6). Let us help them to keep their focus as they learn about God and His Word, and remember their Creator in the days of their youth.

Standing on Biblical Principles

We have just concluded our Deeper Life Services under the theme "Standing on Biblical Principles". During this study we considered a few principles on which Christians should stand, namely **'God First'**, **'Forgiveness'**, **'Stewardship'**, **'Contentment'**. But these are indeed just a few of the Biblical principles. The Bible is replete with such principles, which are really non-negotiable – they follow naturally our commitment to Christ. And we are propelled to them by the admonitions in Phil.1:27 and Ps.119:105.

> Only conduct yourselves in a manner worthy of the gospel of Christ, so that whether I come and see you or remain absent, I will hear of you that you are standing firm in one spirit, with one mind striving together for the faith of the gospel. (Phil. 1:27)

> Your word is a lamp to my feet and a light to my path. (Ps. 119:105)

Very importantly, though, it will be a great challenge to get these principles in place unless the first principle is in place in our lives. Until God is put first, the other principles will be difficult to follow. Two questions important to ask are: 'Do I value what God values?' 'Do I trust God completely?' We would be reluctant, negligible, even afraid, to put any other principle in place if we cannot answer these questions in the affirmative. The **'God First'** principle opens the door for all others.

Another principle that will help to facilitate the others is **'Love'**. True Love for God will cause us to give him the best of ourselves. And true 'Agape' Love for others will cause us to give to them the best always. In 1 John 4:7-8 we are thus admonished to Love, as Jesus challenged in John 13:34-35.

> Beloved, let us love one another, for love is from God; and everyone who loves is born of God and knows God. The one who does not love does not know God, for God is love. (1 John 4:7-8)

> A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another, even as I have loved you, that you also love one another. By this all men will know that you are My disciples, if you have love for one another. (John 13:34-35)

It is Love which will lead us to Forgive others and free ourselves from such stresses as self-pity, misery and depression. It also frees us up to be good Stewards of what God has entrusted to us, working together with others and their gifts, to enhance His Mission. This both emanates from, and leads to, **Contentment.** Being thankful for what we have, we will use it for gain, and be equally thankful for what it produces. (See Matt. 25:14-26)

When we put God First, his love will cause us to Love others, hence allowing us to forgive. We will then clean up our vessels through this **Forgiveness**, facilitating our effort at faithful **Stewardship** of what God has invested in us, and leading us to Contentment.

Remember the admonition about our wandering hearts, given by the songwriter in our Theme song:

Thy Word is a lamp unto my feet, And a light unto my path. I will not forget Your love for me, and yet, My heart forever is wandering. Jesus, be my guide And hold me to your side; I will love you to the end.

The 13th Moravian Women's Conference, coordinated by the Interprovincial Women's Board of the Moravian Church in North America, was convened during the period June 20-23, 2019 at the Embassy Suites in downtown Winston-Salem, North Carolina, under the theme "Unleash your power". Fifteen ladies from the Barbados Conference were in attendance, including Sis. Joyce Walcott and Rev. Roslyn Hamblin *(see picture).*

For Bethlehem's 55th Anniversary (August 13) the congregation was challenged to consider the question "What Time Is It?" and urged to see it as a time for Reflection, Introspection, & Projection. The Scripture Readings for the day suggested that God has something in store for us (Gen.15:1-6), but we must be alert lest we miss it (Lk.12:32-40). We Reflected on our rich history, gaining congregational status in 2 years, acquiring church, manse and hall in the 70's and 80's, and becoming a light in the community. For Introspection we were urged to compare our membership now with the pinnacle reached in 1977 (136); to consider whether we have been effective stewards of our property; and assess whether we are still in our community, as a church. We were then led to consider where we want to go and to make Projections on how we will strategize to get there.

At this Anniversary then, What Time Is It? It is time for Stock-taking – for Reflection, Introspection & Projection.

Our anniversary coincides with the Anniversary the Spiritual Baptism of our Church in 1727. Like our ancestors of that time, we at this time, need to be touched again by the Holy Spirit.

Back-To-School Service

The Back-to-School Service was held on the last Sunday in August, and 2 boys and 17 girls, primarily between the ages of 4 yrs and 17 yrs, received packages. One student is moving on to University this year. The packages contained stationery/school items and were presented by members of the Elders' Board.

The messages for that day focused on the account from Luke 13 where Jesus was teaching the people in the synagogue. The students were reminded that although the Teacher taught, it was the responsibility of the learners to learn, and so they also had a responsibility.

In the account, there were two types of learners – the receptive one and the resistant one. The receptive learners were the ones who were, above all, willing to be taught; as the psalmist wrote – 'Teach me Your ways, O Lord; I will walk in Your truth' (Psalm 86:11). Receptive learners also listen and obey the good instructions of their teacher. In so doing they can gain good results and blessings from God. While on the other hand the resistant learner, like the two magicians in Exodus, are often unwilling to listen to those over them and suffer the consequences -- 'Now as Jannes and Jambres resisted Moses, so do these also resist the truth ... but they will progress no further, for their folly will be manifest to all, as theirs also was.' 2 Timothy 3:8,9.

It was here that they were reminded of the costs which often accompanies disobedience. These include unplanned sacrifices like having to repeat exams, or the loss of blessings God has in store for them.

The students then received the charge that, as they return to the classroom, they should be receptive learners; willing to be taught, listening and obeying what is right.

Above all else, ask God to guide you in school, to keep you focused on your learning path, and protect you going to and from school. Do not forget to pray every day and night, before and after school, and remember Philippians 4:13 "I can do all things through Christ who gives me strength."
