At its core Love is sacrifice – it is in giving not in getting. "But God shows His love for us in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us." (Romans 5: 8).

Love is generous. "Do not say to your neighbour, 'Come back tomorrow and I'll give it to you'— when you already have it with you." (Proverbs 3: 28).

Love is unending: it is not merely a feeling – it is a commitment. It is not defined by emotion nearly as much as it is by devotion. "Love never ends." (1 Corinthians 13:8)

Love can be undeserving and is often unreciprocated. I do not believe it is required for you to like people in order to love people. "You have heard that it was said, 'Love your neighbour and hate your enemy.' But I tell you, love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you." (Mathew 5: 43-44).

From the Pastor's Desk

'Remember & Celebrate'

March is a time of

reflection and celebration within the Moravian Church. It was at this time of the year that the Unitas Fratrum (Moravian Church) was established in Czechoslovakia in 1457. This was inspired by the teachings of John Hus, a Bohemian priest born in 1369, who spoke out against the corruption of the Roman church in his day and promoted the following.

- That the sale of indulgences was iniquitous.
- That the Laity should be allowed to receive the cup at the Lord's Supper.
- That worship should be conducted in the language of the people.
- That Christ alone should be recognised as Head of the Church.
- That the authority of the Bible should take precedence over the authority of the Church.

Rather than seeing reform, Hus was burnt at the stake on July 6, 1415. But his teachings and principles lived on, and in March of 1457 his followers organised themselves into a church known as the Unitas Fratrum. Although the exact date is unknown, March 1 is recognised as the Birthday of the Moravian Church. The Sunday closest to March 1st is therefore observed as Unity Sunday annually.

On March 26, 1467, at a Synod in Lhota, Czechoslovakia, the Unitas Fratrum decided by "Lot" to establish its order of ordained ministry and three (3) men were chosen, again by "Lot", as its first ministers. The Sunday closest to March 26 is therefore marked as Theological Education Sunday annually.

As a Church that 'remembers', we must also be a Church that 'celebrates'. We must therefore allow our history to impact our lives and strengthen our faith and commitment. Our Church was born out of the deep conviction and strong faith of John Hus – a faith which led to his martyrdom. Our Church must continue to live by this faith, committed to Christ at all cost. We must stand for what we

believe, and live daily by our convictions. We are called to follow Christ, even when the cost is great. Jesus said, "Take up your cross, and follow me". He further asked, "For what shall it profit a man, if he shall gain the whole world, and lose his own soul? Or what shall a man give in exchange for his soul?" As Moravians, we need to live by our motto: "Our Lamb has conquered; let us follow Him"!

- Prayer
- Penitence
- Claiming the Promise
- Executing the Plan

Thanks to our Caterer, Margaret Jackman, for the delicious lunch provided. We then worked in groups to discuss the following:

- What you do consider to be some of the elements for change?
- In what ways is teamwork relevant to change?
- What are some major hindrances to change?

Sentiments from the groups included lack of prayerful life, self-pity, praise and thanksgiving to God, being too comfortable, sacrifice and self-surrender. The information and suggestions were inspirational and soul-searching

We were challenged and reminded by Rev. Roslyn Hamblin not to let it be a 'talk shop', but to get out of our comfort zone and take action with the information She reminded us to review our retreat commitment card, which was part of the booklet provided, and to sign them as a pledge to our commitment going forward to "Advance the Kingdom: SHIFT".

As the retreat came to a close, Rev. Hamblin led us in the Cup of Covenant. The hymns 'What brought us together', 'Facing A Task Unfinished', 'In your Hands' and 'We are One in the Spirit' were sung, and the Bible reading came from Jeremiah 18:1-6. We then parted with prayer and went on our way feeling refreshed – having all truly enjoyed the fellowship, the meal, and the environment with outgoing and incoming Board members.

(Then and Now)

With March 1st upon us, when we celebrate yet another year of witness, let us pause for a 'pulse check' (our vitals) looking back and forward. We have a rich heritage of education and outreach. As we focus today on Education and Worship, let us ask ourselves – "How Can We Do More" towards Outreach" "What SHIFT is required in order for us to be a part of what is needed today to Advance God's Kingdom?

EDUCATION:

Education has played a vital part in the history of the Moravian church. Globally, Moravian schools and colleges are found throughout the Moravian world. Within the Barbados Conference the Schools established over the years were Edgehill, Montgomery, Buxton, Gracehill, Sharon, Mt. Tabor, and Roebuck. Some of our chapels had also been used as schools in the early days – eg: Centenary and Dunscombe.

Education continues to be a part of our Programmes in Barbados. The method of education has varied from the establishment of academic schools to Sunday Schools - for years not just designed for our children and youth, but including an adults class. The Sunday School Programme remains a mainstay in all congregations education also ranged from Bible Study - whether morning, mid-day or evening – to the training of our Laity through our Conference Lay Academy Programme or congregational Laity Training Programme (Preaching, Leading Worship, Moravian History, and other leadership development training); from Retreats to sleep-in Camps; and through various activities within the auxiliary groups of the congregations (eg: Quiz competitions). Efforts are on-going to improve and increase the participation in these areas as they remain important paths towards Christian growth and development, and our on-going christian education programme.

In our congregation mid-week Services not only feature evening sessions but include morning or mid-day sessions to cater to those who no longer drive at night, have unavoidable evening commitments (eg: care of the elderly), or are simply available in the day. Effort is being expended to maintain these vital elements of our educational thrust. Other educational efforts include Congregational Retreat, on-going and *ad hoc* Training (eg: choir, dance, piano, drum, leading worship, SS teachers, and multi-media).

Bethlehem has conceptualised a monthly newsletter, released in the last quarter of 2016, which continues to strive for outreach, education and information-sharing among our membership to encourage and support all other efforts of the Church, while engaging our membership in sharing in Ministry and Worship.

WORSHIP:

We have always heard it said that Moravians love to sing. Worship in the Moravian tradition still has a strong

emphasis on music, with Choirs and Chorales, and musical instruments – particularly organ and piano, and even brass bands – playing an integral role. Our choir performs each Sunday. Organ, Piano, Keyboard, Drums – acoustic and bongo – Tambourines, as well as the occasional saxophone, guitar, recorder and steelpan renditions are used at various times and seasons in the worship experience.

The Moravian Lovefeast is still practised from time to time – a service of song with the sharing of a very simple meal (a special bun with ginger beer, mauby or lemonade). A Moravian devotional guide called The Daily Texts, published since 1731, is still in use today, and Bethlehem has added two other devotionals prepared annually for the Lenten and Advent Seasons, featuring devotions penned by our membership. The liturgies of the church still follow the seasons of the Church Year. The Christmas Candlelight Service – a festival of carols and readings – and the Easter Sunrise Service remain as annual highlights for congregational worship.

CAN WE DO MORE?

Together as a team (Pastors, Boards, Auxiliary groups, the entire membership), as we make plans in relation to the life of our congregation (not only in the areas of education and worship, but also quality social engagement with the community and each other) let us consider individually and as a body 'How We Can Engage More' to Advance the Kingdom, and make the SHIFT needed to serve our community and to minister to those in need within or outside the 'walls'?

Some More Burglary Prevention Tips

Most burglaries are committed when the home are left unattended. These culprits are mainly opportunists and

they will take advantage of an easy target. Do not make it easy for them.

- * Install a deadbolt lock. Use deadlocks that are usually locked with a key from the outside and on the inside. The cylinder should be pick-resistant. Lock your doors every time you leave the house, even if you're leaving for just a few minutes during the day. The most popular times for residential burglaries are weekday daylight hours. In some of these burglaries, there is no forcible entre someone forgot to lock the doors.
- * Mark your property. Mark your valuables with an engraver. Marking your property serves as a deterrent to would-be burglars and it helps police in identifying, tracing and returning stolen property. Make a property identification lists. Operation identification is such a service offered by The Royal Barbados Police Force, free. Call your police station and make your request.
- * Purchase a burglar alarm. A home alarm system can be a very effective burglary deterrent and fits into many people's needs. Remember to test your system monthly.
- Use proper exterior lighting. Place a light over every door. Use good exterior lighting on each corner of the house, also light up windows. Leave lights on, close bedroom drapes and blinds.
- Work together with your neighbours. When you are going to be away, tell trusted neighbours and ask them to watch your property. When on vacation, have someone cut grass. Shrubbery should not hide neighbours' view of windows and doors. Have someone pick up newspapers and mail. Tell neighbours to call police if they notice anything suspicious. Form or join a neighbourhood watch.

Guidelines to avoid the spread of 2019 Novel Coronavirus – an emerging infectious disease Also known as COVID-19

(Education and Awareness is key as we move from Preparedness to Readiness to Rapid Response)

Frequent handwashing is the most effective way to help prevent infections. By washing your hands, you can prevent germs from spreading to your body and causing illnesses.











Proper handwashing

- Remove any rings. Use warm water and wet hands thoroughly.
- Use liquid or foam soap and lather very well.
- Scrub hands between fingers, under nails and at the base of thumbs for 15 to 20 seconds.
- Rinse thoroughly.
- > Dry hands with a single-use towel or hot air dryer.
- Turn off taps/faucets with a disposable paper towel.
- Protect hands from touching dirty surfaces as you leave the bathroom (e.g. doorknob).

If caring for someone who is ill, the following guidelines will aid in preventing the spread of germs:

SEQUENCE FOR REMOVING PERSONAL PROTECTIVE EQUIPMENT (PPE)

Except for respirator, remove PPE at doorway or in antercom. Remove respirator after leaving patient room and closing door.

1 GLOVES

- Outside of gloves is contaminated!
- Grasp outside of glove with opposite gloved hand; peel off
- · Hold removed glove in gloved hand
- Slide fingers of ungloved hand under remaining glove at wrist
- Peel glove off over first glovet
- Discard gloves in waste container

2. GOGGLES OR FACE SHIELD

- Outside of goggles or face shield is
- . To remove, handle by head band or ear pieces
- Place in designated receptacle for reprocessing or in waste container

- Gown front and sleeves are contaminated!
- Unfasten ties
- Pull away from neck and shoulders, touching inside of gown only
- · Turn gown inside out
- · Fold or roll into a bundle and discard

4. MASK OR RESPIRATOR

- Front of mask/respirator is contaminated
 DO NOT TOUCH!
- Grasp bottom, then top ties or elastics
- · Discard in waste containe
